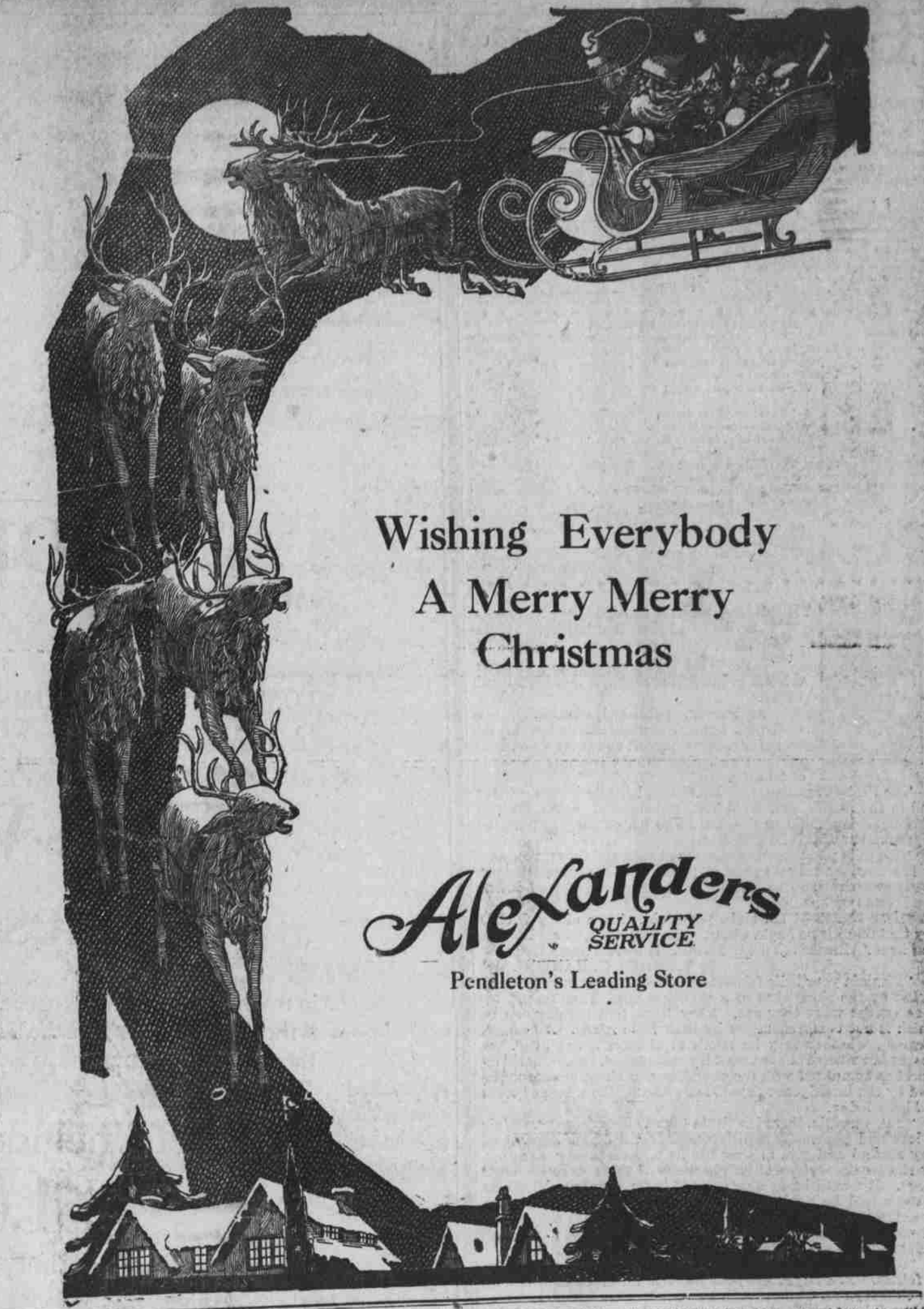
**GIFTS FOR ALL PUPILS GIVEN AT BOARDMAN**
