 S. A. Barnes was an Athena visitor from Weston Wednesday.

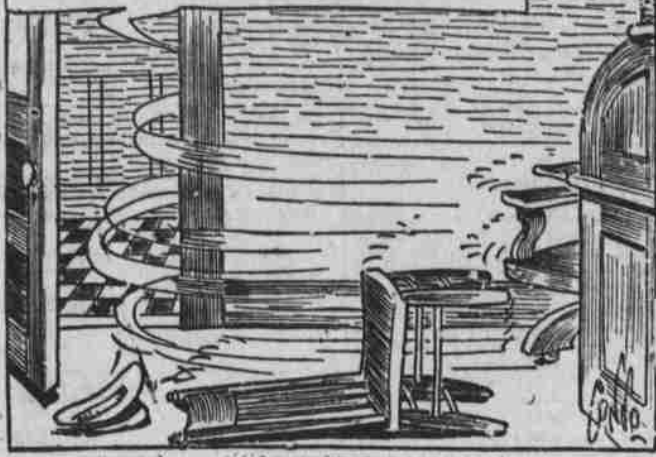
is visiting his "boyhood's happy home" in the Weston and Athena communities. Mr. Swagart is now located near Baker, Oregon, where he is engaged in farming.
