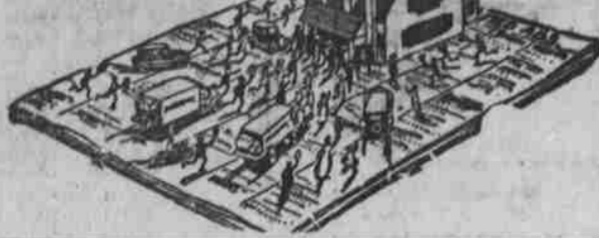

10,000 ARE HOMELESS AS RESULT OF TREMOR

PARIS, Jan. 3.—(A. P.)—Fourteen persons were killed, 300 injured and 10,000 rendered homeless by an earthquake which nearly obliterated Eibassan, Albania, according to a dispatch today from the American Red Cross at Tirana.

The only Americans there were two Junior Red Cross nurses, Miss Norah Kuddy, St. Louis, and Miss Winifred Warren, Chicago. Both were reported safe. They immediately took charge of relief work and the American Red Cross is sending supplies.

NEWBERRY CASE NOW BEFORE HIGH COURT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Reconvening today, the supreme court will face a calendar of assigned cases declared to be unusual, both as to number and public interest.

Eighteen cases are listed on the Monday calendar, though since it will be "decision day," chances are arguments will not be heard in more than two or three.

The government suit against the United Shoe Machinery Co. and the cross bill of that corporation heads the list.

Other cases include the appeal of Senator Truman H. Newberry of Michigan and others from conviction under the corrupt practices act and a series of suits involving the right of the alien property custodian to seize bonds deposited in the United States before the war by German insurance companies to protect American policy holders.

CITIZENS MUST REPORT ALL BEARING OF ARMS

CORV, Jan. 3.—(A. P.)—Any person knowing others to possess arms or ammunition must report immediately or render themselves liable to prosecution, Major General Strickland, commanding troops in Munster, announced today. It is also forbidden to assist rebels. The order is effective Tuesday.

The people are warned that they must not fail to report the rebels and their movements at once. Appearance before a military court is the alternative, the major states, adding that an attitude of neutrality is punishable. It declares persons who do not do their utmost to prevent damage to government property will be dealt with severely in person and estate.

Sending of code telegrams without permission of the police inspector is banned and use of wireless or carrier pigeons is prohibited.

All meetings and assemblies are forbidden, six adults being considered a meeting.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(U. P.)—President Wilson is expected to send to congress a veto of the resolution reviving the war finance corporation it was indicated at the whitehouse.
