Areas Are Reported.

The Hermiston district of the Umatilla irrigation project has an irrigable area of 26,300 acres with 7,335 acres under water, according to the biennial report made yesterday by Percy Cupper, state engineer. The report for the Teel district shows an irrigable area of 16,000 acres, with \$1,200,000 bonds voted; \$220,000 bonds certified; \$10,000 expended in construction and \$220,000 bonds issued since 1914. The irrigable area for the John Day district is given as 255,000 acres.
