X-RAY USE SPEEDS PLANE CONSTRUCTION

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 4.—(A. P.)—An up-to-the-minute application of X-rays is used in airplane construction to show up defective materials, workmanship and weak metal castings, which would otherwise escape the observation of an inspector, according to John S. Shearer, of Cornell, in speaking here on "Recent Advances in the Production and Application of X-rays."

"Grains of wood in airplane parts are brought out remarkably," he said, "and it is easily discernible where two different woods have been joined together, a point of construction prohibited in airplane work. Knots in the wood are also shown up, as is unsatisfactory gluing together of parts."

"Electric heating coils are inspected by X-ray and the plates show the manufacturer where air has caused the insulation of the coil to disintegrate, and where the wire will eventually break."

EXTRAVAGANCES TRAIL SOUTH SEA TRAVELERS

PAPEETE, TAHITI, Jan. 4.—(A. P.)—Those who brave the long voyage to the South Seas in the hope of escaping the extravagances of civilization are likely to meet with bitter disillusionment before they have been in the islands many hours.

The hectic atmosphere of the metropolitan dance hall has been wafted across the long miles of blue sea to these isolated shores and Broadway flaunts brazenly through the shadows of the coconut groves. The gramophone has come to Tahiti and has been acquired by every native who could find the wherewithal. And now the peaceful silences, broken heretofore only by the sound of the distant booming of the surf on the barrier reef and the soft cadences of native singing, are shattered by the sonorous blare of the latest jazz or the screech of the reigning favorite on the vaudeville circuit.

JAPAN HAS MILLION BIRTHS AND DEATHS

TOKIO, Jan. 4.—(A. P.)—Japan's population during the year 1919 was increased by only 300,000 as against a usual rate of 625,000, according to an official report of the recent census. During 1919 births numbered 1,827,481 and deaths 1,513,687, the net gain, therefore, being 303,794. Reduced number of marriages in consequence of higher cost of living is one reason given by the authorities for the falling off. But it is probable that the principal cause was an abnormally heavy infant mortality due to the influenza epidemic.

The divorce rate in 1918 is unofficially returned at 112 per thousand marriages. This compares with a German divorce rate of 216, which is the highest in Europe. It should be remembered that these unofficial statistics are subject to correction.

NEW SHIPS ABANDONED
TOKIO, Jan. 4.—(A. P.)—Owing to the continued shipping depression and to the fact that ten of the surrendered German ships have been allotted to Japan, the Nippon Yusen Kaisha has abandoned its program for the construction of 150,000 tons of new ships with the exception of about 150,000 already built or ordered. Under the program the company has already acquired fourteen freighters aggregating about 100,000 tons. Six 7,000 ton freighters are being built and will be delivered next year as well as 3 freighters of the 100,000 ton type and two passenger steamers. It is expected that most of the German ships will be operated by the Nippon Yusen Kaisha under arrangements with the Japanese government.

RECORD CROWDS ATTEND COAST HOCKEY CONTESTS

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 4.—(A. P.)—Record crowds are attending the games of the Pacific Coast Hockey Association in Seattle, Vancouver and Victoria, the three cities represented in the organization. At Vancouver recently it was estimated that 7,500 people attended the opening game. Standing room only signs are displayed at every game here.
