NEW NATURALIZATION LAW FAIR TO WOMEN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—(A. P.)—Dramatic changes in the naturalization law, especially as applying to women, are provided in a bill reported favorably today by the house immigration committee. The measure will take the place of two naturalization bills on the house calendar and an effort will be made, according to representative Johnson of Washington, chairman, to have congress approve it at this session.

Women under the bill no longer would derive citizenship from naturalization of husbands, but would be required to make individual applications for citizenship.

They also would not lose their American citizenship by marrying aliens except when an alien husband cannot lawfully become an American citizen, or when a woman resides two years in her husband's country, or five years in some other country.

ATHLETIC RELATIONS BROKEN BY EUGENE WITH SALEM SCHOOL

SALEM, Or., Jan. 7.—Athletic relations with the Salem high school were severed by the Eugene high school in a letter received by Principal J. C. Nelson of the Salem high school from G. E. Finnelly, principal of the Eugene school, Tuesday. Finnelly explains his action in severing friendly relations with the Salem school as due to differences arising out of a football game between the two schools at Eugene recently. His letter was in reply to a request for a game with the basketball quintet of the Eugene school, which he characterized as not advisable under the circumstances.

TOURIST BUSINESS STIMULATES HOTEL BUILDING IN WEST

Increased Business During 1920 Caused New Hotel Construction at Various Points; Camp Sites Valuable

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 7.—Hotel building in the Pacific Northwest is being stimulated by the heavy tourist traffic of 1920, which taxed hotel accommodations in most of the cities and towns and resulted in the expenditure of approximately \$45,000,000 of tourist money in the Pacific Northwest, according to the information received by the Pacific Northwest Tourist Association.

Among the cities where new hotels are being planned and financed are: Walla Walla, Everett and Grays Harbor, Washington, and Corvallis, Ore. New hotels, of considerable capacity

are already assured in two of these cities and it is expected that hotel construction will be underway in several Washington, Oregon and British Columbia cities before spring. Additional accommodations to the extent of 200 rooms will also be provided at the Rainier National Park in time for the 1921 summer season.

Camping sites for automobile tourists are also being provided in cities and towns which have not previously established them, on account of the heavy automobile tourist travel last summer. A check of auto traffic in Portland showed that five times more cars from other states visited Portland in 1920 than in any previous year.

Herbert Cuthbert, secretary of the Pacific Northwest Tourist Association, returned recently from the East where he perfected arrangements with tourist agencies and railway officials to send even a greater portion of the tourist traffic to the Pacific Northwest during 1921. Effect of the heavy tourist traffic is being felt by inquiries received by nearly every commercial organization in the state from people looking for opportunities for settlement or business openings.
