DEFRAUDER SHOOTS SELF WHEN CRIME IS KNOWN

SPokane, Jan. 10.—(A. P.)—The arrival today of James P. Callahan, millionaire mining operator of Wallace, Idaho, is expected to shed additional light on the alleged operations of John E. Mitholland and Jay B. Hough, by which, according to Hough's confession yesterday to the authorities, Callahan was defrauded out of three hundred and fifty-three thousand dollars through the forgery of bonds. Mitholland shot himself to death last night. Hough was arrested. Mitholland ended his life in a suicide pact with Hough, who disregarded the pact and revealed the alleged embezzlement.

SINN FEIN FRUSTRATED BY MILITARY FORCES

DUBLIN, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—Military forces frustrated a plan for a Sinn Fein attack in the heart of Dublin. Reports to headquarters today stated that a body of Sinn Feiners cut through a wire barricade on the long stretch of road leading into the city, planning to ambush troops. Soldiers were rushed there, taking a number of prisoners. The incident was only one of a number of skirmishes during the week-end.

The raids were conducted in Cork. Among the prisoners taken were two young girls, one of them with a revolver hidden in her corsets and the other with a pistol in her pocket. Further property punishment was exacted at Camlough, where a constable was killed last week. Two houses belonging to Frank Aiken, prominent Sinn Feiner, were burned. Most of the town's population fled before the soldiers arrived. The holding of the American vessel Honolulu by military forces at Cork engrossed the Sinn Fein and military authorities. The captain of the vessel protested when she proceeded up the River Lee to Cork. The ship carried provisions for citizens of Cork.

BRITISH OFFICER SAYS BIG NAVY IS FOOLISH

LONDON, Jan. 10.—(A. P.)—Viscount Rothermere, former secretary of state for the air forces, in an article yesterday in the Sunday Pictorial, headed "The Folly of the Big Battleship," submits a startling contention challenging the traditional basis of the British naval policy. The doctrine he propounds is that it is no longer possible for a nation to possess command of the seas.

He condemns British participation in big battleship rivalry with the U. S. and Japan because "they obviously are building against each other and not against us."

He urges Great Britain cannot afford to spend any money on naval construction at present. Furthermore, he declares, "if the U. S. and Japan persist in pursuing antiquated forms of warfare, that is no proof the capital ship will survive, and concludes that no nation henceforth will enjoy naval supremacy."

LUMBER MANUFACTURERS MENACE TO BUSINESS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—Lumber manufacturers of the country, through ten regional associations are able to control production, stifle competition and prevent price declines, the federal trade commission charged in a special report. The report, with a mass of self-denigrating correspondence to support the charges, was forwarded to congress. The evidence is also given the department of justice, it was announced.

Particular interest is attached to the report because the price of lumber has been a large factor in the almost complete halting of the home building, which resulted in a housing shortage and high rents.

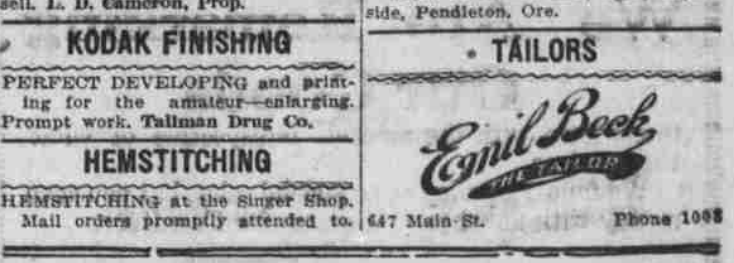
