MASTER WRITERS MAKE BIG FILM

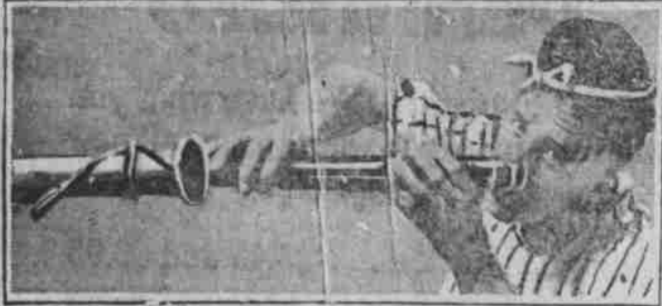
Gouverneur Morris is famous for his tales of love and adventure—stirring, vivid and true to life. George Randolph Chester is equally noted for his stories, such as the

Nose Flute Is Latest



The inventor of this remarkable instrument is Walter C. Chambers, a U. S. soldier stationed in the Philippines. Then the player hums with the mouth closed.

UNITED KINGDOM HAS NEW STANDARD OF COINAGE

LONDON, Jan. 11.—(A. P.)—A new standard of silver coinage has just been put into effect in the United Kingdom because of the great increase in the value of silver.

New sixpences, shillings, florins and half-crowns, now only contain one-half of pure silver instead of 27-40th as heretofore.

A larger admixture of alloy became necessary when the old coins became worn more than their face value.

The new coins are harder, and are expected to outlast the old ones, which are being called in and will be minted into new currency.
