**M'CARROLL DRAWS 100 DAYS AND \$100 FINE**  
One hundred days in jail and a fine of \$100, the maximum penalty provided under the laws of Oregon, was the sentence meted out to Ray McCarrroll by Circuit Judge G. W. Phelps this morning, when McCarrroll stood before him for sentence on the charge of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated. McCarrroll pleaded guilty to the charge Monday afternoon.

A second jail sentence, of 30 days, was given for a similar offense in the justice court, to Wilfred Minthorn, an Indian. Both he and McCarrroll started serving their sentences in the county jail today.

In pronouncing sentence, Judge Phelps delivered McCarrroll a pointed lecture. He declared that the law does not provide a maximum penalty of sufficient weight and that McCarrroll should consider himself fortunate not to be on trial for murder as a result of his reckless ride down Main street a month ago in which he narrowly missed denying death and injury to others.

McCarrroll asked the court for leniency because of the fact that he was once fined in police court for the offense and because he has a wife and small children.

### OFFICIAL STATEMENT IS EXPECTED WITHIN 48 HOURS ON CABINET

Opposition in Many Quarters to Appointment of Political Personnel Causes Remodeling of Practically Definite List.

MARION, Jan. 12.—(U. P.)—Official announcement from Harding regarding his cabinet is probable within 48 hours, according to authoritative information. Appointments of Hughes as secretary of state and Charles G. Dawes as secretary of the treasury may also be made at the same time. The opposition in many quarters to appointment of a "political cabinet" is causing Harding to make over his list, which was fairly definite 10 days ago. The targets of this opposition are Harry Daugherty of Ohio; G. H. Hart of Kentucky; William H. Hays of Indiana and John W. Weeks of Massachusetts. If cabinet posts were offered these men, as is claimed by some, it would be in the nature of political rewards for political service.

### CHANGE IN HIGHWAY BOND ACT CONSIDERED

SALEM, Jan. 12.—(U. P.)—Various members of the senate, including those whose districts lay along the coast are seriously considering an amendment to the Roosevelt highway bonding act adopted by the people at the special June election. It would provide for the state expending two and one-half millions on the road, and not awaiting for a like amount to be appropriated by congress, as the adopted act required.

### REVISION OF MARRIAGE LAWS URGED BY DEAN

SPOKANE, Jan. 12.—(A. P.)—All state legislators of Spokane and nearby districts will be called upon by Dean Wm. C. Mickes of All Saints Episcopalian cathedral here to support a bill for the revision of marriage laws and registration of clergymen, which is being prepared for submission to the legislature, Dean Hicks announced today. The bill, which is being drafted by Dean Hicks, he said, is designed to make marriage laws more strict and to eliminate so-called "marrying parlors" through compulsory registration of ecclesiastical status. The state confederation of churches with headquarters at Seattle is to be asked to endorse the bill which Dean Hicks announces he personally will present to the legislature.

OLYMPIA, Jan. 12.—(U. P.)—Representative Grass introduced a bill in the Washington legislature providing that the dependents of peace officers killed in line of duty shall be entitled to receive \$5000 from industrial insurance bonds.

### COUNTRY TAKES BIG LEAP IN GOLD STOCK

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—(A. P.)—A net gain in the country's stock of gold of \$106,600,000 during 1920, as against a net loss of \$291,700,000, was announced last night by the federal reserve board. Gold imports for 1920 totaled \$428,700,000 against \$76,500,000 for 1919, while gold exports aggregated \$322,100,000 as against \$568,200,000 exported in 1919. Silver imports totaled \$58,100,000 as against \$58,400,000 in 1919; while exports amounted to \$112,000,000, as compared with \$233,000,000 in 1919, making the net silver loss through exports for 1920 \$25,600,000, against \$149,600,000 for 1919.

### LANDIS IS HANDED ALL REINS OVER BASEBALL

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—(U. P.)—Baseball's national convention by which Judge Landis is given complete authority over the organized game, was ratified by all factions, cliques, and leagues today. The agreement, finally signed by the two major leagues, and representatives of the minors, gives Landis complete jurisdiction.

### U. S. WILL BE SUPERIOR IN SHIPS AND GUNS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—(U. P.)—In major ships and in gun power, the United States will be superior to the British navy when this country's building program is completed in 1923. Secretary Daniels told the house naval affairs committee today in disclosing the relative sea strength of Britain, Japan and the United States. This country's construction plans will also put America ahead of Japan in total tonnage of fighting ships at the ratio of two and one-half to one, Daniels said. He added, however, that should Japan build the program which she has projected, but not authorized, the ratio in America's favor would decrease to that of one and a quarter to one.

### NEW RULING AFFECTING SPECIAL DELIVERY NOW ELIMINATES SIGNATURE

Under a new regulation made by the postoffice department, Postmaster Cronin today announced, patrons receiving special delivery mail will no longer be required to sign for it, and if the person is not at home the mail will be left in their mail box instead of being brought back to the post office for future delivery by the regular carrier. Patrons using the special delivery service are cautioned that this mode of delivery insures no additional safety over ordinary mail and is designed only to expedite and not safeguard mail. All valuable letters containing currency etc. should be registered and may be sent special delivery if desired. The usual receipt by the addressee is required if the special delivery mail is sent registered or C. O. D.
