He declared that the law does not provide a maximum penalty of suf-ficient weight and that McCarroll should consider himself fortunate not to be on trial for murder as a result of his reckless ride down Main street a month ago in which he narrowly missed dealing death and injury to others.


**COUNTRY TAKES BIG** LEAP IN GOLD STOCK

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12 .- (A. P.)-A net gain in the country's stock on gold of \$105,500,000 during 1970, an against a net loss of 1919 of \$291,700,-000, was announced last night by the federal reserve board. Gold imports for 1920 totaled \$428,700,006 against \$76,500,000 for 1915, while gold ex-ports aggregated \$222,100,000 ag aggainst \$368,200,000 exported in 1919. Sliver imports totaled \$88,100,000 m against \$85,400,000 in 1919, while exports amounted to \$113,600,000, as compared with \$2359,000,600 in 1919, making the net silver loss through ex-perts for, 1920 \$25,660,000, against \$149,600,000 for 1919.
