NEWS OF ATTEMPTED PLOT TO ESTABLISH A SOVIET RULE REVEALED

VIENNA, Jan. 12.—(A. P.)—Details of the recent attempted plot in Jugoslavia to establish a soviet government following a general strike were received today. A newspaper strike in South Jugoslavia related the details. According to a statement by the interior minister of the constituent assembly, the communists planned to murder former Premier Venitch, imprison the prince regent and proclaim a proletarian dictatorship. The communists had accomplices in the royal guard, the police, the army and the telephone service, according to M. Drachovitch, and were ready to seize the mails and establish communication with Moscow. Many bombs, explosives and firearms were procured. It is alleged the newspapers were ready to go over to the communists. Many men who had made large profits from the sale of necessities of life at exorbitant prices were found on the side of the communists. Several hundred communists have been imprisoned.

THE LAUGH IS ON TOM BY ALLMAN

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN TO BE HONORED MONDAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—(A. P.)—The versatile accomplishments of Benjamin Franklin will be retold throughout the country by various organizations on January 17, the 215th anniversary of his birth. In a number of celebrations tributes will be paid to him as a statesman, diplomat, philosopher, scientist, journalist, economist, salesman, philanthropist, humorist, printer and publisher.
 As an advocate of spending less than one makes, Franklin is to be honored on his birthday by the National Thrift Week Committee, which is encouraging other celebration of his work. University of Pennsylvania alumni here plan to hold him as the founder of their alma mater.
 Libraries in many cities will call attention to Franklin as the founder of the first public library in the colonies.
