Wires to be Added.

The local office of the Western Union announced today that construction will start immediately on six additional transcontinental copper wires from Pacific coast points to New York, and numerous additional wires between principal centers in Washington, Oregon, California and neighboring states.

The new facilities touching the coast will involve an expenditure of \$2,999,899 and add 16,994 miles of wire to the present plant.

Royal Neighbors Give \$10.

Ten dollars raised by the Royal Neighbors of America for the Central European Relief was turned over Wednesday afternoon to C. K. Cranston, treasurer, by Mrs. Walter Jones, representing the order.

E. P. Dodd in Salem.

Bill Proposes Change.

Umatilla county remains in the second congressional district in a proposed reapportionment of the counties in the congressional districts as outlined by Senator Norblad at the state legislature. The district if the change was adopted, would remain the same, but the first and fourth districts would be changed.

Police Hold Two Men.

Two men, one a Mexican, were arrested on the streets here today by the local police on request from Pasco. They are alleged to have entered and robbed a house at or near Atalla, Wash. Officers will arrive on tomorrow morning's train from Pasco to identify the pair. Meanwhile they are held in the city jail.

Operates Without License.

W. P. Ellis, who operates a bus line between Pendleton and Tith, was arrested by Traffic Officer William Loy-Jay Wednesday afternoon on a charge of carrying passengers for hire without having a city license. He was obliged to purchase the license and was dismissed by the recorder without a fine.

Takes Permit for Residence.

J. H. Dunham, contractor, today was issued a permit to build a \$4000 bungalow across the street from where his partner, Charles Brownlow, plans to build a \$5000 dwelling. Both houses will be thoroughly modern and be occupied by July 1. Mr. Dunham and Mr. Brownlow are members of the firm of Dunham, Brownlow, Payne & Ross and both decided to build now.

Legislative Measures to Be Sent.

Bills introduced both in the senate and house at Salem during the present session of the legislature will be sent to the Pendleton Commercial Association for reference purposes by Colon R. Eberhard, joint senator from Union and Umatilla counties. In a letter received from him today he notified the association that he would supply this service.

Insurer Will Inspect Flour.

Max Houser, president of the Portland Flouring Mills today was designated by the European Relief Council to send an inspector to examine the flour which Umatilla county has milled to send for European relief. He will also see that the flour is properly handled for shipment overseas. A telegram notifying the local committee of this action was received by Chairman J. V. Tallman from New York headquarters.

Rev. Myers to Assist.

Rev. P. P. Myers, of Indiana, will arrive in Pendleton this evening to assist with the revival services which are in progress at the Nazarene Tabernacle. Rev. Myers is an excellent singer and speaker. The meetings have been in progress for over a week and are expected to continue until the last of February. Rev. Cornelius who is doing the preaching, will have for his theme this evening "Excuses." Special singing is a nightly feature, the songs being sung by Rev. Cornelius and Mr. Campbell.

Glee Club coming.

The Willamette Men's Glee Club will sing in Pendleton, February 3, at the Methodist Episcopal church, under the auspices of the Epworth League. Last year the league guaranteed the appearance of the club here at \$100 and because the performance was prevented by influenza, the league lost the money. There are 17 members in the glee club and they are highly recommended.

Rabbit Shoots Planned.

Echo is planning a rabbit shoot of large proportions for Sunday on Butter Creek. An invitation from the Echo fold was received today by local shooters to join with them in the drive. It will not be competitive as was the shoot held by the Pendleton Rod & Gun Club on Sunday but will be held for the purpose of ridding the country of the pests. A lunch will be served at noon to all the participants. A week from Sunday the Hoskins boys will be hosts at another rabbit shoot at the mouth of Staggs Gulch near Stanfield. They have also asked local shooters who desire to come and take part and they promise a free lunch to all who assist them in the raid on the bunnies.

LACK OF INVENTORIES WILL COST U. S. VAST SUM

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—Failure of the shipping board to make accurate inventories of its surplus materials valued at millions of dollars, is costing the government a vast sum, the house committee investigating the board's operations was informed today by C. R. Taylor of the comptroller's department. He said he "doubted" whether officials of the board "knew exactly what is stored in various warehouses."

The shipping board is buying supplies at high prices in the open market, Taylor charged, when the materials in many instances are piled in its own warehouses.

Taylor directed his criticism at the division of supply and sales, whose head, H. B. Miller, testifying later, agreed "conditions are not satisfactory."

The latter added that inventories had been begun to ascertain the exact contents of all warehouses.

Both witnesses advocated immediate sale of all materials not needed by the divisions of construction and operation. Miller estimated that the number of employees in his division thereby could be reduced from 1400 to 200 and an annual overhead of at least \$3,000,000 in his department eliminated.

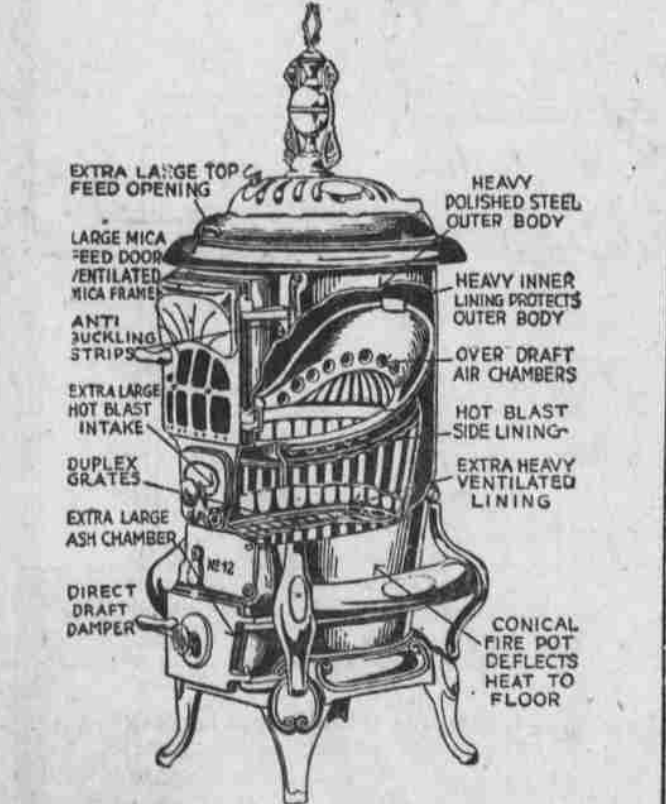
