attended a meeting of Indians from six different churches. About nine new members joined the church. The Umatilla Indians were accompanied here by Hubert Tetoby and Billy George, Bannock Indians from the Blackfoot reservation who are returning from Kamiah. Motanic states that the delegation was up all night on the return trip, due to bad roads from the church to the town where they boarded the train.

**School Is Held.**  
A number of Pendleton women are attending the sewing school held today at the office of Mrs. Edith G. VanDusen, home demonstration agent. She is teaching how to alter

patterns; make pleated skirts, tailored bustings; pockets; bound buttonholes and arrowheads. A similar school will be held January 21. Mrs. VanDeusen just completed three days instruction to Milton women, who completed five dresses and remodeled some garments.

## John Beam Resigns.

J. E. Beam, bookkeeper with the city water commission for the past 18 months, today tendered his resignation to take effect Feb. 1. His health is given as the cause of his retirement. Mr. Beam went to St. Anthony's hospital last evening for treatment.

## Oddfellows Going to Weston.

They will take 10 or more candidates for the local lodge and initiate a similar class for the Weston lodge. About 10 motor cars are expected to make the trip and a social hour is to follow the work.

Quite a number of Pendleton shooters today signified their intention of going to Echo tomorrow to join with the citizens of that town in a rabbit shoot which will be staged on Butter Creek. The success of last Sunday's shoot held by the Pendleton Rod & Gun Club has resulted in a lot of interest in the shoot tomorrow and it is expected to be well attended.

## Present Weather "Too Good."

The present weather conditions are declared by some wheat and fruit men to be "too good." The mildness and continued rains has produced growing weather and it is feared that if February and March turn cold much damage will be done by frosts. So long as the weather does not turn cold there is no damage done but with sap coming up in the trees and wheat growing, a dry, cold spell would result in damage.

## Wheat Selling Not So Brisk.

Sales of wheat yesterday and today were not as brisk as at the opening of this week, grain buyers today said. The reason for the falling off in sales is that the top prices have failed to hold up and Chicago has shown nearly a 10 cent drop from the peak recently reached. When local buyers paid \$1.50 for No. 1 club wheat, several thousand bushels were unloaded but now the price has dropped back in the local market to about \$1.45 for strictly No. 1 stuff.

## Legion Endorses Bonus Measure.

With an unanimous vote, members of Pendleton Post, American Legion, last night endorsed to the state legislature the proposed state bonus bill for former service men from Oregon. The action of the post is to be communicated by the adjutant to the state headquarters and to the state legislature now in session in Salem. A resolution signed by 24 legion men in Adams, unable to be present, was read in which they assured the post of their unanimous support of the proposal.
