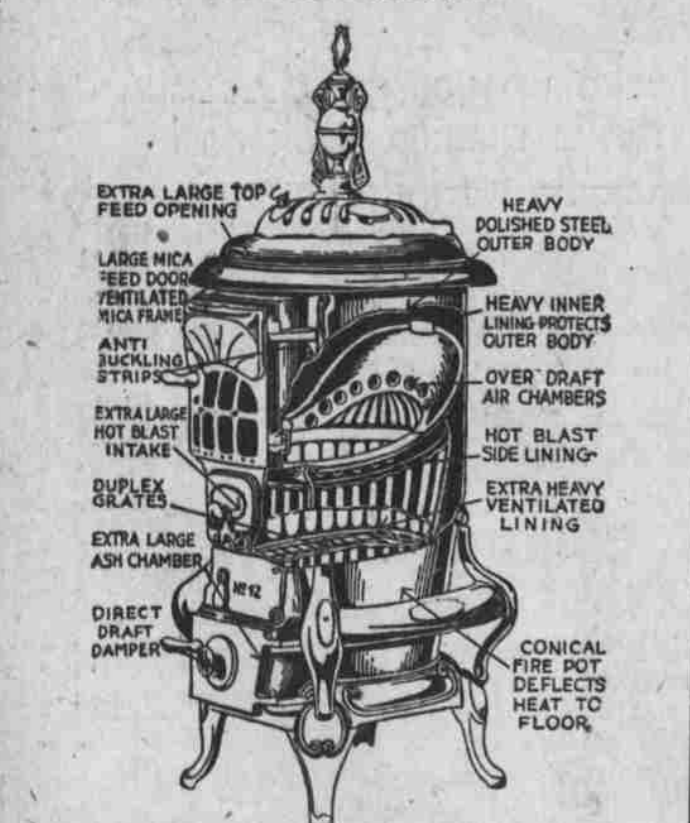

**Children Under 6 Not Desired**  
Children who will not be 6 years old by March 1 are not desired as new students in the first grades of the Pendleton schools, for the term beginning Jan. 24. This announcement was made today at the office of the city superintendent. Arrangements have been made to accept a few children as beginners next Monday, providing they are 6 or will soon be. No beginners in other classes will be accepted as the work continues as a unit for the year. A few classes will be organized in the high school but as there are no students being graduated from the grade schools, only a few are expected.

**Hospital Site Being Sought**  
The public health service of the U. S. treasury department is renewing efforts to get the old Fort Walla-Walla site for a hospital for disabled service men, says a letter received today by the Pendleton Commercial Association. The barracks, while not used now, are a part of the war department's equipment and cannot be made a hospital for disabled veterans unless the war department will transfer the property to the treasury department. Requests were recently sent to the bureau of war risk insurance, which also comes under the head of the treasury department, by the American Legion hospitalization committee for Washington, that the barracks be fitted up for a hospital and vocational training school for disabled veterans.

**May Revive Athletic Club**  
Revival of the Pendleton Athletic Club through the efforts of Community Service, may be the result of the meeting on athletics tonight, called by R. E. Tucker, local organizer for Community Service. Mr. Tucker in calling the meeting, has asked all the members and officers of the athletic club to attend. The session will be held in the meeting rooms of the Pendleton Commercial Association at 7:30. According to reports which have reached Mr. Tucker, there is need in this city for continuing an athletic club but lack of a concentrated support and a competent management has made the enterprise short lived. Other items of athletic interest, which can be worked out by the public in gen-

eral, will be considered at the meeting tonight, which, the organizer says, is open to the public.
