Richard Rice, who attended Culver Military Academy last year and this year, will take up his studies at the Pendleton high school with the opening of the second semester next Monday. He did not return to Culver after arriving in Pendleton for the Christmas holidays. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. M. Rice.

Prizes to be Awarded

Prizes for attendance at the Salvation Army Sunday school will be awarded on Saturday by Captain Jennie Conrad. There are from 79 to 89 children at Sunday school each Sunday and from among their number will be chosen winners of the first, second, third and fourth prizes. Testaments will be among the prizes given.

Signs Are Placed

Signs designating the intersection of trails, the location of creeks and other streams are now being placed on the Umatilla National Forest as a forerunner of the coming summer season. Each year the forest rangers do this work. About 100 signs will be placed on the forest. Later in the season, the fire prevention signs are put up.

Meeting is Postponed

A meeting of the Church of the Redeemer tonight, at which Norman Johnson, state Sunday school organizer, was to speak, has been postponed. Mr. Johnson wired this morning that it would be impossible for him to be in Pendleton to address Sunday school workers of the city tonight. The meeting will be held at some future date.

Wheat Condition Good

Umatilla county's wheat is in an excellent condition for farmers. There is more moisture in the ground than at this time last year, because the precipitation occurred this year when the ground was soft and receptive. There have been some complaints from the Weston region, where, because of the water-soaked ground, there is some gullying in the hillsides.

Ask Red Cross Aid

The names, rank and army organization of all ex-service men who are in the State Hospital because of mental disability is wanted by the Federal Board of Vocational Guidance, which today asked that the local office of the Umatilla County Red Cross secure the date. The work will be taken up by Miss Virginia Todd, secretary. The board hopes to place all Northwest ex-service men now in hospitals for the insane at a general hospital at Shelton, near Tacoma.

Third Car Costs \$2742.42

The third carload of flour shipped for the relief of Central Europe cost the committee \$2742.42, according to a draft received this morning by C. K. Cranston, treasurer for the European Relief Council here. The flour was billed by the Preston Shaffer mills at Athens and the Peacock mills at Free-water and the slightly higher charge than the first two cars is believed due to the milling in transit cost on wheat. Umatilla county's donations of flour are all packed and paid for today.

Community Service Committee to Meet

The temporary committee, which made application for Community Service in Pendleton will meet at 4:30 Friday afternoon in the Commercial Association meeting rooms to lay temporary plans for the permanent organization. In addition to the members of the temporary committee, several other business men will be called in to the meeting. Following the adoption of a plan of action, a community mass meeting will be called probably next week for putting through a definite organization. The members of the original committee are: J. R. Raley, George A. Hartman, C. K. Cranston, H. E. Inlow, John Vaughan and P. L. Idleman. Probably as many additional men will be asked to assist in the planning which will be done on Friday.

Supply Train Comes

A supply train of about 20 cars, from the Albina shops, Portland, was here this morning delivering supplies to the various departments of the O. W. R. & N. Co., and picking up out of date materials for the junk pile at the Albina yards. The train is being sent over the system as far as Huntington. The private car of M. J. Buckley, superintendent of the road, was attached to the train. Mr. Buckley accompanied it to make a close inspection of the road.

Will Order Nitrate

Arrangements for a pooled order of a carload of sodium nitrate were completed yesterday at Milton at a meeting of the Fruit Growers Union. The nitrate is used as fertilizer and its value has been proven by demonstrations in the Milton region. According to Fred Bension, county agent who attended the meeting, the fruit trees are covered with buds but because of the injury done by the severe weather last winter, the trees, unless nitrate is used, lack the vigor to carry the crop, which is in sight. The fertilizer will be applied, a month before blooming time, at the rate of four or five pounds to a tree. The growers at the meeting re-elected their executive board for the coming year.

NINE TEAMS STILL GO IN 6-DAY BIKE RACE

CHICAGO, Jan. 18.—(A. P.)—The 44th hour of the six-day bicycle race found nine of the 12 teams which started bunched with a record of 750 miles each, one team out of the running and two trailing a lap behind the leaders. The team of Madden and Madden was in the lead in points, however, with 22.

GALVESTON, Jan. 19.—(U. P.)—The bodies of Mrs. Francis Brown and M. S. Settle were found shot dead in an automobile standing in the street in a fashionable residential district early today. Brown walked to the home of Constable Gregory and surrendered. The woman was shot through the heart and the man through the head. Both were about 35.

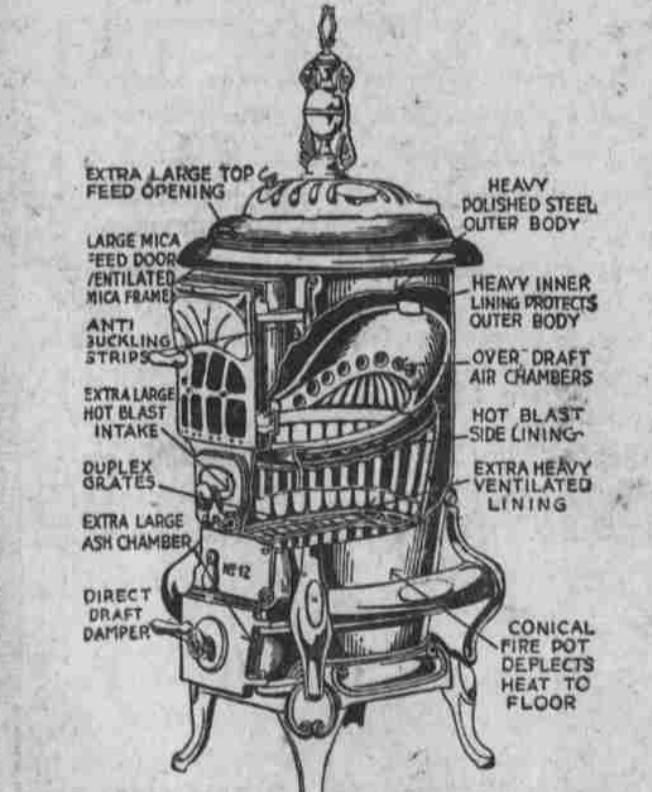
