The bride was attended by Miss Virginia Todd, local Red Cross secretary. The marriage comes as a surprise to friends of Mr. and Mrs. Spencer, who will make their home in Pendleton.

**Rabbit Shoot Sunday.**  
Local sportsmen are evincing interest in the rabbit shoot which will take place on Sunday at the Hoskins Brothers ranch in the State Gulch region. The Hoskins Brothers will act as hosts and a dinner is to be served to the rabbit hunters.

**Weston Sends in Balance.**  
Twenty three dollars, the balance for the Red Cross roll call collected in Weston, was received today by C. K. Cranston, county chairman, from S. A. Barnes, local chairman. Weston raised \$192.11 for the Red Cross. With Miss Virginia Todd, local Red Cross secretary, the roll call total passed the \$2000 mark, the exact figures being \$2311.91. Milton, under Mrs. T. C. Elliott, remains to be heard from before the final report can be made up to this county.

**Will Attend Meeting.**  
S. J. Culley, of Weston, left today for The Dalles to represent the Umatilla County Farm Bureau at a meeting of representatives of the Farm Bureau, Farmers Union and Granges of the state, who will decide whether or not the farmers will join in a co-operative grain marketing association. A. J. Shumway, Umatilla county man who is president of the state Farmers Union, will be present. A contract is to be presented and the meeting promises to be one of great interest. Sherman and Morrow counties are more interested in the proposed organization than are other counties in the state.

**Two Building Permits Granted.**  
Building permits were issued to two householders today by the city recorder, both being for additions or repairs. Robert Simpson, 1201 East Court st., will add a sleeping porch to his dwelling at a cost of \$150. Mrs. Cecil B. Sturges was issued a permit to remodel her home at 216 Monroe street at a cost of \$250.

**National Council to Meet.**  
The national council of the United States Chamber of Commerce is to meet in Washington, D. C., Jan. 27, according to word received today by the Pendleton Commercial Association from Joseph N. Teal, member of the shipping board. Mr. Teal said he would attend this meeting and represent the local association.

**Automobile Men to Elect.**  
Officers for the Pendleton Automobile Dealers Association will be elected for the coming year at the banquet and annual business meeting to be held this evening in the Commercial Association rooms. The banquet, in the Elks dining room, will take place at 8:30, with the election and business meeting to follow. Plans for the annual auto show in March, which are being formed by a committee at work will be heard tonight.

**Community Service Body Meets.**  
The temporary committee which made the request for Community Service in Pendleton, will meet at 4 o'clock this afternoon with R. E. Tucker, organizer, in the Commercial Association. There will be present also a number of additional representatives from various civic bodies and a plan for permanent organization will be offered. This meeting is in preparation for a community mass meeting which is soon to be held for permanent organization.

**Train Crews Arrange Schedule.**  
Trainmen working on passenger trains over the second division between Pendleton and Huntington are now on a definite schedule. Owing to frequent delays of trains due to arrive at the terminals about the same time, "train grounds" were numerous. A schedule is now in effect whereby each crew has the same eastbound train out of Pendleton on alternate days and the same westbound train out of Huntington on the return. There are eight crews employed on the four passenger trains between here and Huntington.

**Meeting Date Changed.**  
To speed up the action of the Umatilla County Farm Bureau on the proposed wheat pool for co-operative wheat marketing, the date for the annual meeting of the county Farm Bureau has been changed from Saturday, January 29 to Thursday, January 27, a week from yesterday.
