The case of Art Hardin versus Guest Cuertaso, was begun in the circuit court today. The action is the result of the shooting affair at Rieth last year. The plaintiff is suing the defendant for \$15,000 damages.

F. Van de Water. Miss Case is a Metropolitan star soprano. She is known for her beauty as well as her voice, and has appeared on the moving picture screen. She is one of New York's most popular singers and is meeting with success on her western tour, according to Miss Burnett.

**New Case Filed**  
F. M. Kiger as plaintiff filed suit for damages and a restraining order against the Brownell Livestock company this morning in the Circuit Court. It is alleged in the complaint that the Brownells sold a piece of land bordering the city of Umatilla to H. E. McKinney and that the main inducement of the sale was that the highway forming the outlet to the land was a permanent roadway. McKinney later sold the farm to Kiger and the latter alleges that the livestock company is now threatening to close the road, thus leaving him with no means of marketing his produce in Umatilla. The plaintiff prays the court to prohibit the company from closing the road, to prevent the placing of posts and ditches in the road, and for damages amounting to \$2500.

**FUTURE OF WOMAN'S PARTY TO BE DECIDED AT NAT'L CONVENTION**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—(U. P.)—Whether the National Woman's Party continues as a separate political group will be decided by 1000 delegates representing every state in the nation when they meet here February 15.

Prime consideration in the decision, officials said in commenting on the convention's program is whether the existing parties have made sufficient bid for support from women voters. The third day's sessions will be given over to reports of spokesmen from the republican, democratic, socialist and farmer-labor groups.

The meeting will be the first national gathering of women voters since ratification of the nineteenth constitutional amendment.

Important places on the program have been given to representatives of women's organizations to report on progress in organizing women in America and abroad. Among bodies to report are the W. C. T. U., National Consumers' League, Business and Professional Woman's League, Woman's Bureau of the department of labor.
