months, or any service copies. As was noted on October 1, there was an average of 384 subscribers in arrears, a total of 112 service copies and 81 unpaid copies. Practically without exception the accounts in arrears are good accounts, many of these being farmers who have taken the paper for years and they may be correctly rated as paid circulation. The service copies and unpaid copies few in number, also go to bona fide readers and with the exception of a few relatives go to parties from whom service is received in exchange.

As has been frequently stated in the past the circulation books of the East Oregonian are open to all. Any businessman or any competitor has the privilege at any time of observing the press run, questioning any employee and of otherwise checking up on circulation statements in any manner desired.
