The exact amount of the appropriation is to be determined in consultation between Senator C. L. McNary and Secretary F. Houston, of the department of agriculture. D. Zurcher, attorney from the west end town. The flour for the relief has been shipped but as yet final disposition of the fund has not been made.

The Oregon committee on Chinese relief is composed of E. B. Piper and A. L. Mills of Portland. There is a possibility a luncheon may soon be arranged here to discuss the matter of a drive for this county.

### Boy Scouts To Meet

The local organization of Boy Scouts will meet tonight at the county library, where the boys will take scout examinations. Dr. R. C. Ellsworth, scout doctor, will give "setting up" exercises and first aid instruction. Mrs. Edith G. Van Deusen, scout mother, is planning to take the boys to the high school domestic science department in the near future to give instruction in scout cookery.

### Riverside to Be Visited

Riverside school this afternoon is to be told of the plans for Community Service in Pendleton. R. E. Tucker, local organizer, will make the address upon invitation from the Riverside Parent Teacher Association. While that community is not a part of the city of Pendleton, it is interested in the work being done here and may find means of joining in a part of all of the work, Mr. Tucker said.

### Oregon Prune Week Announced

Oregon is being asked to observe prune week, from Feb. 14 to 19, inclusive, as a help to the growers of this state in moving their crop of 1920. An Oregon Prune Campaign Committee has been organized in Portland, with Fred S. Bynon, formerly a local attorney, as secretary. Notice of the week's designation, and a plea for local cooperation, were received by the Pendleton Commercial Association today from Mr. Bynon.

### Old Check Cashed Post Mortem

A check for \$5 issued by Henry J. Taylor on September 17, 1912, came back for payment a few days ago, after B. F. Crawshaw, to whom the check was issued, had died in Portland. Mr. Crawshaw had endorsed and misplaced the check several years ago and it was found, presented and paid by his widow. Mr. Taylor found, by consulting his old stubs, that the check was good and he met the payment.

### Weather Will Decide Shoot

If Sunday's weather appears to be favorable, the rabbit shoot planned by the Pendleton Rod & Gun Club at Sand Hollow will be held. The dozen shooters who met last night took a look out of doors at the flurry or snow and the rain and decided that they would withhold definite announcement as to plans. The present plan is to notify the prospective members of the shooting party tomorrow evening at the legion boxing match.

### Local Club Enters Tourney

The Pendleton Rod & Gun Club has received notice that it has been accepted as a contestant in the weekly trapshooting league conducted by the Spokesman Review. The towns of the inland empire engage every Sunday in telegraphic shoots, the scores of the five highest guns being counted. The first shoot, it is expected, will be on Sunday, Feb. 27, although actual dates and other data have not been received by C. G. Matlock, secretary of the club. The tournaments continue through the summer.

### Eberhard Favors Wheat Bill

Colon R. Eberhard, joint senator from Umatilla and Union counties, favors the passage of senate bill No. 182, the wheat grading bill recently introduced as a measure of relief for the farmers of eastern Oregon, he says in a letter received this morning by the Pendleton Commercial Association. He is also willing to assist toward the elimination of waste in the conduct of charitable institutions throughout Oregon, he said. This matter was recently endorsed by the local association, following a communication sent out by the Astoria Chamber of Commerce.

### Legislative Committee to Visit

The joint committee on ways and means, of the Oregon legislature, will spend Saturday in Pendleton, visiting the Eastern Oregon State Hospital for a conference with Dr. W. D. McNary, superintendent, on the needs of the institution for the coming biennium. This committee has already visited the university and agricultural college and other institutions on the west side. Senators Patterson, Norblad and Upton and Representatives Pierce and Hurd are members of the committee. While here they will be guests at luncheon in the Elks club, of President Roy W. Ringer, of the state senate, who will be home over the week end. A few local businessmen will also be guests. The legislators will be asked to attend the Umatilla Rapids Power meeting and have also been extended an invitation to attend the American Legion boxing smoker in the Oregon theater at night.
