PRESENCE OF WOMEN DON'T STOP GENERAL'S FLOW OF CUSS WORDS

Charles G. Dawes Tells Investigating Committee That Army Supply Was Hindered by Partisan Politics in War.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(A. P.)—Charles G. Dawes, former head of the army supply procurement service in France told the investigating committee their work was rendered useless through injection of partisan politics. "You cannot put a blotch on the army. What the hell did we go to war for—to steal? It was not republican or democratic it was an American war, yet as a rule these committees try to bring in partisan politics."

The proposal committee does not include any lowering of initiation fee nor other fees, members say.

FRISCO NEWSIES ON STRIKE CAUSE RIOT

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 4.—(U. P.)—Police Captain Goff was hit over the head and one arrested was made in a series of small-scale riots which attended the unorganized strike of newsboys here last night and early today. The strike was directed against the increase of fifty cents per hundred in the whole sale price of the Chronicle and Examiner, morning newspapers. The newsies, in several instances, took papers from boys who were selling them and made bonfires.

INDIAN BILL CUT WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(A. P.)—Items aggregating about \$2,900,000, stricken from the Indian appropriation bill by the house on points of order were restored today by the senate Indian committee in reporting the bill to the senate. The bill as reported carries about \$13,000,000.
