completion of the power plant and the delivery of water.

Ontario Experiment Successful.

"The development of hydroelectric power by the government power commission has been undertaken in the province of Ontario, Canada, with amazing success. The development of hydroelectric projects undertaken by the Ontario commission is financed by funds raised on the credit of the province. These funds in turn are paid off through revenue derived from selling electric power to cities, towns, railroads, factories and homes for both light, power and heat. A recent report of the organization and work of the Ontario commission shows large reductions in the cost of elec-

tricity per horse power as supplied by the commission compared with the cost when supplied by corporations.

"The benefits which will come to our community on our states from the development of the power projects along the Columbia can easily be seen, therefore we should all keep at our task and get Umatilla rapid harnessing.

"In conclusion, the most feasible plan to follow, in financing this development, to my mind is under the government power commission. The government can absorb the heavy costs very easily and extend the repayment over a long term of years, as was done in the irrigation development of the various projects in our western states."

BOOK CIRCULATION AT LIBRARY GAINS IN YEAR

The book circulation of the Umatilla County Library system gained 15,535, or 40 per cent, over the 1919 circulation, according to the complete 1920 annual report which shows a total of 68,590 books issued to Umatilla county homes throughout the past year.

The figures show gains over 1919 of 5,924 volumes for Pendleton, 580 for Athena, 88 for Echo, 75 for Fossil, 1649 for Freewater, 349 for Helix, 418 for Hermiston, 649 for Pilot Rock, 42 for Ukiah, 84 for Umpigne, 1143 for Umatilla, 925 for Weston and 2253 for rural schools. The best showing in fiction per cent is in Pendleton which issued only 65 per cent of fiction to adults. Athena is very close with only 66 per cent of fiction circulated. This means that a more encouraging amount of informational reading is being done.

As for children's reading, the branches showing the best records are Helix with 62 per cent of its books loaned to children and Hermiston with 45 per cent to children. The Hermiston building is well situated for this purpose, being only one block from the school house so that the children can easily run in at noon recess and after school. The school branches naturally excel, in issuing books to the children. Ferndale with 74 per cent and Umpigne with 58 per cent.

The new book acquisitions of 1920 totaled 1715 volumes. There were 2665 cards added to the catalogue. Three hundred and thirty four home reading certificates were issued to children of the county who met with the requirements furnished by the county library. This meant the looking over at the central office of 2240 book reviews and the filling in of the certificates.

The books sent out by freight, express and parcel post from the central office to branches and rural schools totaled 2592 volumes. This is not included in the above total of 68,590 books issued for home use over the loan desks of central and branch libraries.

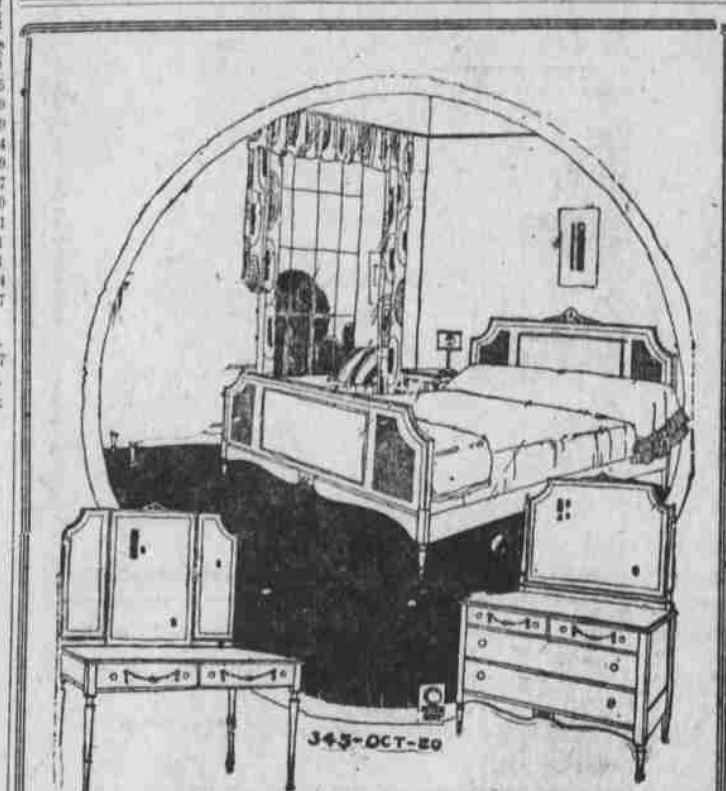
