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BASKETBALL FOUNDER IS HONORED BY LIFE MEMBERSHIP ON BOARD

Dr. James Naismith Developed Indoor Game 30 Years Ago and Now is Placed on Committee on Rules.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Feb. 8.—(A. P.)—The honor paid to Dr. James A. Naismith by the National Intercollegiate Athletic Association of America—life membership on the basketball rules committee—comes to him 30 years after he invented the game of basketball. Doctor Naismith is head of the department of physical education at the University of Kansas.

Basket ball was the result of a deliberate attempt to evolve a game suitable for men to play indoors. In 1891, Doctor Naismith was in charge of a gymnasium class at the Springfield, Mass., Y. M. C. A. then an instructor at college for athletes and association men. The men enrolled in the class were football, baseball and track athletes and became weary of the inside work consisting of boxing, wrestling and swimming.

At a meeting of the Y. M. C. A. instructors, some one suggested that invention in the use of things at hand. Doctor Naismith remarked that invention of a new game was possible. He concentrated for weeks on this idea.

When the question of goals came up Doctor Naismith decided he must have receptacles in which to throw the ball. This idea was borrowed from the old game of "Duck on the Rock." The upright type of goal obviously could not be used, nor any goal which would allow the game to become strenuous by permitting excessive force in scoring.

The superintendent of grounds was asked to furnish two boxes, 18 inches square. But these were not available. Just then and two peach baskets, were offered. Doctor Naismith took them and hung one at each end and the court, using the gallery for support. Since the height of the gallery happened to be 10 feet, that is the present height of the goal.

Lacrosse furnished the plan for arranging the men on the court. The inventor decided to have the game started by throwing up the ball and having one man from each side jump up at it. The team consisted of nine men at first. The number was reduced to seven and later to five, as the skill of the men developed.

Doctor Naismith was born in Canada. He is a graduate of McGill University and also of the Gross Medical School. He came to the University of Kansas as associate professor of physical education in 1908, becoming a full professor in 1908. During the war he served with the Y. M. C. A. in France as director of social hygiene for the American Expeditionary Force.

JACK BRITTON GIVEN JUDGES' VERDICT OVER TED LEWIS IN FIGHT

American More Clever Than British Claimant to Welterweight Title; Free-for-all Looms During Early Rounds.

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—(A. P.)—Jack Britton, world's welterweight champion, cleverly defended his title against Ted Lewis, who claims the English championship, in a 15-round bout at the Madison Square Garden last night. The judges agreed on Britton as the winner.

The men weighed in at 145 pounds each. Both were in excellent condition. Lewis had the better of the exchanges in the first two rounds during which both battled with their tongues as well as with their fists. Britton protested against Lewis having a number protector in his mouth to guard his teeth.

When the bell had separated the men after the second round some one in Lewis' corner shouted at Britton who turned quickly and rushed back to Lewis' corner sending his gloved left hand into the face of Charley Harvey, Lewis' manager. Lewis took a swing at Britton and it looked for a time as if there was going to be a free for all fight.

The men were separated by their handlers and Britton returned to his corner. One of the boxing commissioners decided that Lewis had a right to wear the rubber guard and there was no more quibbling.

From the third round the champion got his clever left hand working and he kept jabbing and hooking it into Lewis' face, occasionally raising these blows with rights to the head or stomach.

Lewis seemed unable to avoid Britton's baffling left hand thereafter except in the 10th when he landed two, telling lefts and a right swing on Britton's head. This round was about even with the exception of the first two, Britton had the honors.
