## P. T. A. CONVENTION IN MAY

The Parent Teacher Associations of Pendleton will be hosts May 11 to May 14 for the State Parent Teacher Association, which meets here this year for its annual convention. Plans for the convention were made yesterday at a meeting of the Pendleton Parent Teacher Council, of which Mrs. Will R. Wyrick is president, the other members being the presidents of the various Parent Teacher Associations of the city, the past presidents, one representative from each association, the school principals, members of the school board and city school superintendent.

The date of the convention will permit delegates to attend the joint Parent Teacher convention of Oregon and Washington to be held in Walla Walla May 14. About 50 delegates are expected to attend the Pendleton convention from associations in various cities of the state outside of Pendleton and doubtless many will attend the joint convention also. Pendleton, with a total membership of between two hundred fifty and three hundred, has one of the strongest associations in the state and last October at the Portland convention had the largest delegation outside of Multnomah county.

The program, as yet, is tentative. Mrs. C. W. Hayhurst, state president, will attend and will be one of the speakers. Among the state officers are two Pendleton women, Mrs. Wyrick being third vice-president and Mrs. Thomas Hampton one of the directors.

## ADMIRAL ORDERED TO TAKE CHARGE SITUATION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(U. P.)—Secretary Daniels ordered Admiral Bryan, commander of the central American squadron, to proceed immediately to Nicaragua and take charge of the situation brought about by marines wrecking a newspaper plant at Managua.

Twenty-one marines were involved in the attack on the newspaper plant, Daniels advised in his dispatch. All have been arrested. The marines destroyed the plant, the dispatch stated, following newspaper attacks on American forces.
