CAMPAIGN FOR PRUNE WEEK IN STATE IS ON

The idea of setting aside a week to be known as Oregon Prune Week, during which time efforts will be made to induce every resident of the state to consume a quantity of Oregon grown prunes, or to send to Eastern friends a quantity of the fruit, is credited to Fred A. Kurtz, son of G. Frederick Kurtz, the pioneer of the prune industry in Oregon.

This Year's Crop This year's prune crop is given at 20,000,000 pounds. Of this amount there remains approximately 22,000,000 pounds, un sold and in the hands of the growers and packers. The growers have decided to sell their product at a reduced figure in order to close out their holdings and to leave a clean slate for next year's crop. By this method, it is claimed, both the grower and the consumer will be benefited.

Leading Men Interested Leading men of the state, in all lines of activity, have given their hearty approval to the plan and are unanimous in their prediction that when launched the campaign will be a great success, resulting in unending good to the prune industry.

LARGEST SHIP AFLOAT MAY BE USED AGAIN

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—(A. P.)—Restoration to overseas commercial trade of the 50,000 ton passenger liner Leviathan, the largest ship afloat, will be considered by the U. S. shipping board, it was learned here recently. The ship, after completing her work as an American transport, has been lying idle. Bids for her reconditioning offered about a year ago called for \$3,000,000 to \$19,000,000 expenditure to restore her to normal condition. This work now could be done, it was said, for several millions less.
