HOUSE DEFEATS IRRIGATION BILL 11 TO 43 THEATER COSTING \$80,000 WILL RISE BEGINNING APRIL 1

VAUDEVILLE AND MOTION PICTURE HOUSE ASSURED

Greulich & Matlock Announce Tentative Agreement With Parker & Banfield for New Amusement Palace on Main.

PIPE ORGAN WILL BE ONE OF ITS FEATURES

Building 50 by 100 Feet Will Have Balcony and Seat 850 Persons; Plan for Big Opera House Not Abandoned

A new vaudeville and motion picture theater to seat 850 persons and to cost when completed, \$80,000, will be erected on the west side of Main street, near Webb, beginning April 1.

The new theater will be 50 feet frontage by 100 feet deep and will rise where the present T. P. Cafe, Clover Leaf Dairy, White Doughnut Lunch, Leedy Clear Store and Green Jewelry now stand.

The building will be devoted exclusively to theater purposes. C. G. Matlock, one of the owners, today said: "There will be a main floor and balcony, seating in all 850 persons. Comfortable upholstered opera chairs will be installed. Particular attention will be given to a heating and ventilating system."

Pipe Organ to be Bought. A pipe organ will be one of the features of the new theater now lacking in other houses here.

In explaining why they are going ahead with plans to build a picture show house on the Main street property, instead of on the location formerly chosen for a big road show theater, Greulich & Matlock stated that at this time it is impossible for them to obtain sufficient capital for the more costly opera house.

"We have been approached by owners of the largest chain of theaters in the northwest, seeking to purchase a part interest in our holdings here," the local men stated. "We feel confident in saying that the larger house will be built in the spring of 1923. With the addition of the larger opera house later, we are confident that the amusement-loving public of Pendleton will have two theaters on to the standard of theaters in cities much larger than Pendleton."

\$1,551,013.44 COUNTY TAXES TO BE PAID IN 1920, SAYS ASSESSOR

Figure Includes Various State, Irrigation District, and Sub-division Levies; School Tax Forms Big Item.

Umatilla county will pay, in taxes of all kinds, \$1,551,013.44, according to the completed roll of 1920 taxes, completed today by R. O. Hawks, assessor, and ready for transfer to the sheriff on Monday for collection.

The total of county and state taxes is \$889,193.75 and comprises the chief item. The next important item is the special school tax of \$416,245.81. Umatilla high school districts are on the list for \$42,975.82.

The various towns and cities in Umatilla county have levied city taxes of \$129,656.72. The county high school tuition fund calls for a tax of \$27,911.72. The Umatilla Drainage district, which affects territory about Stanfield, has a levy of \$255,955. Fire patrol, paid only by owners of forest lands, totals \$1045.92.
