PAIGE WINS WORLD'S STOCK SPEED RECORD

On January 21 at Daytona Beach, Florida, a Paige 6-66 Daytona stock model, driven by Ralph Mulford, and timed by A. A. A. officials, covered a measured distance of a mile in 35.01

seconds. This time is equal to a speed of 102.5 miles per hour and is a world's record for stock cars. Fred J. Wagner and P. E. Edwards, well known officials of the A. A. A. contest board were present at Daytona during the Paige speed trials. Under the eyes of these officials the car was checked in, the distance surveyed, and the speed recorded by an electric timing device. The above record is therefore official. The significance of this performance was the revelation of strength and

stamina of a stock car designed primarily for the daily service of the average owner. This achievement means just one thing, perfect construction and super quality.

AUTOMOBILE MUSEUM OPENED BY STUDEBAKER

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Feb. 12.—A museum of transportation of great interest and educational value has been opened here, occupying a considerable part of the first floor in the administration building of the Studebaker Corporation. Gathered there are many types of vehicles, self propelled and horse drawn, from the earliest to the latest.

Since the history of Studebaker and the history of transportation have run parallel, it is only natural that this assembly of vehicles should be gathered in South Bend.

The oldest vehicle in the museum is the carriage used by General Lafayette during the Revolutionary War, while other famous carriages are those of Lincoln and Grant. One of the first prairie schooners also occupies a place in the hall of fame. There, too, there are numerous war vehicles, such as trucks, wagons and huge caterpillar tractors, which have played their part in every important conflict since the Civil War.

Coming down to modern times, a model of every series automobile produced by Studebaker since entering the motor car industry is on exhibit, down to the present Light-Six, Special-Six and Big-Six models. Compulsorily displayed also are the famous gold chassis and gold car which started the industry several years ago and have since been exhibited in every part of the world.

About the walls are large paintings in colors of the Studebaker brothers, who founded the institution, as well as A. R. Erskine, president of the Studebaker Corporation, and E. F. S. Fish, chairman of the board.

A real museum atmosphere is created by the use of placards that tell the story of the vehicles on view, each one of which is mounted on a low platform and set off by a railing, thus giving it individuality.

OREGON TRIMS AGGIES BY 42 TO 13 VERDICT

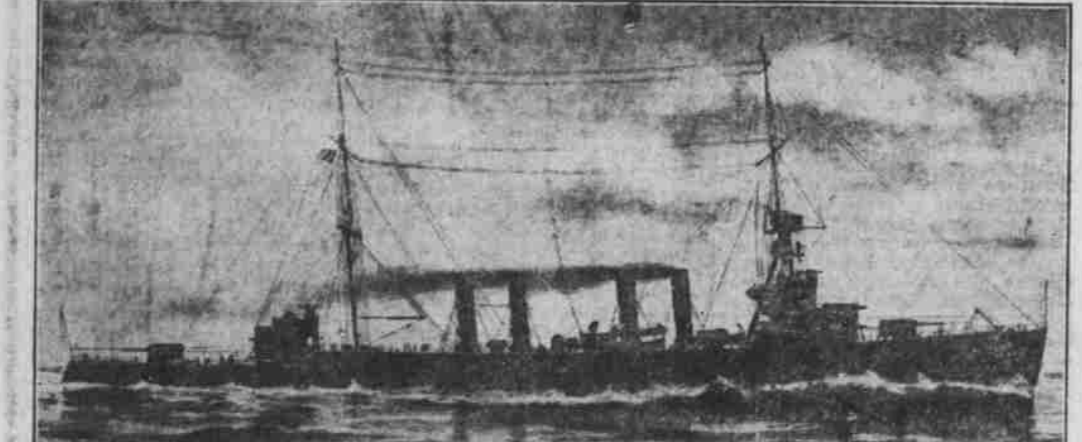

NAVY'S NEW FAST SCOUT CRUISERS



The above picture shows the completed appearance of our new scout cruisers the first of which the Omaha was launched at Tacoma, Washington, in the middle of last month. These ten scout cruisers will be named the Omaha, Milwaukee, Cincinnati, Raleigh, Detroit, Richmond, Concord, Trenton, Marblehead and Memphis. SOMEONE PLEASE TELL HARDING HE'S ELECTED!

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The election of Warren G. Harding of Ohio and Calvin Coolidge of Massachusetts as president and vice president of the United States was formally certified and announced by Vice President Thomas G. Marshall in the presence of the house and senate.

Although the country has known ever since the evening of November 2, last, who would be the next occupant of the white house and the new official word which the law makes necessary was not spoken until today. A month ago, the electors met in the various states and cast their votes. These were sent to the secretary of state, who in turn transmitted them to the president of the senate.

As required by law, the senate and house met in joint session at 1 p. m. At noon the two houses met separately, and the senate, preceded by two pages bearing the official records from the states, marched into the hall of the house. Vice President Marshall presided over the joint session, and the count of the vote began.

Two tellers acted for the house and two for the senate. Vice President Marshall opened the certificates of election and other papers relating to the vote and handed them to the tellers, who read the votes aloud, and recorded them.

When the list of states had been gone through, the votes were totaled and the result was handed to Marshall, who thereupon formally announced the election of Harding and Coolidge.

No debate or remarks by members of either house were permitted during the session. Any objections which members might wish to voice to the counting of any electoral vote were to be put in writing and considered by the two houses separately.

The whole ceremony of canvassing and certifying to the election occupied about an hour, and immediately after the announcement of the vote, the senate withdrew.

This ceremony always has attracted large crowds to the house gallery, and it was therefore a "card day," with admissions limited.

BUILDING INDIA'S NEW HOME RULE MACHINE

DELHI, India, Feb. 12.—The Duke of Connaught today opened India's first elected parliament when he formally inaugurated the new council of state and the imperial legislative assembly. While these bodies will not have full executive power, the viceroys and his council, being supreme, the new constitution gives the natives of India a much larger measure of self-government than they have hitherto enjoyed.

Considerable curiosity, and some apprehension, is evinced as to the success or otherwise of the experiment. The grant of a measure of home rule has naturally encouraged the extremists to demand full powers, and in some cases complete severance from British rule, but the huge number of races and religions represented is the

HENRY FORD SAYS HE IS NOT AT ROPE'S END

DETROIT, Feb. 12.—(A. P.)—Henry Ford doesn't need any money from Wall Street "loan sharks," he declared in an interview with the United Press. He received orders for 67,000 automobiles in January. He expects business conditions to improve. Ford is not going to cut wages, he said. The six dollar a day minimum in his plants will remain in force.

Twenty thousand men are now employed in the Ford plant. The entire payroll of 45,000 men will be employed on alternating two week periods until the full capacity of production is resumed. A good feature of the existing industrial situation is the price of steel is being forced down, Ford declared. "The world today is on wheels. I'm certain it always will be, the motor industry is called upon to supply those wheels and the demand is getting stronger all the time."

This is Ford's answer to those who are saying the automobile industry has reached the end of its rope.
