ASKS THAT MORE CARE BE TAKEN REGARDING EMIGRATION PASSPORTS

THE HAGUE, Feb. 16.—(A. P.)—American consuls in northern Europe have asked the state department in Washington to synchronize the emigrative passport vize standards of the central European consulates with their embarkation inspection standards to avoid the tragic separation of emigrant families at ports of embarkation. Hundreds of emigrants reach Rotterdam, Antwerp, Chenbourg and other ports only to be turned back after quarantine inspection by the American physicians. This synchronization of regulations, officials here say, is necessary now, in view of the typhus outbreak.

Ellis Island maintained under jurisdiction of the U. S. immigration service, is not responsible for the determination and quarantine ships carrying contagious diseases, or the cleansing of vermin-infested passengers and baggage. Supt. P. A. Baker explained today. These duties, he added, were those of the port health officers which in all parts of the U. S. except New York, are under the U. S. public health service.

The examination at Ellis Island is both mental and physical as to the arrival's qualification to land. The physical examination is made by public health surgeons attached to the immigration service and concerns mainly mental and physical conditions which might result in the arrival becoming a public charge. Often in this examination quarantinable disease is discovered in which event the patient is sent back to the custody of the health officers.

GIANT STILL LOCATED.

NORFOLK, Va., Feb. 14.—(A. P.)—A giant among moonshine stills, an ex-15 horse power steam boiler, able to turn out thousands of gallons of liquor, has been seized at West Neck. Tanks nearby held 3,000 gallons of mash.

Enrollment in the course is confined to juniors and seniors, therefore the classes are not very large. The elementary class has 22 students registered who are mostly juniors. The advanced classes are studying Spanish plays.
