Some Expect Wheat to Sell
Some selling of the 1920 wheat crop is predicted between now and March 1 by farmers who would rather take the market price than hold their crop for a possible rise later in the spring and be taxed on their holdings. There are quite a number of large crops still unsold in the county, reports say, and the taxes on them would amount to quite a figure. Selling of late has not been brisk. One crop yesterday, of 2000 bushels, was moved on the basis of \$1.36 for No. 1 club.

New Substation Installed.
The Pacific Power & Light Co. has just completed installation of a small substation on the Rothrock ranch near Havana station, east of Pendleton. This contains switches and a transformer to serve the new homes erected by Rothrock brothers with current from the company's high lines. Material for a similar substation for the Todd ranch, just beyond Riverside, has also been received and a substation will be installed there shortly, the place having been wired for electric lighting. The ranchers also use power for much of their work about the ranches.

URGENT SETTLEMENT OF WAGE DISPUTES

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—(U. P.)—Immediate establishment of adjustment board to settle the wage disputes between the railroads and the employees is urged before the United States railroad labor board by R. M. Jewell, the labor spokesman. Jewell demanded that the railroad executives and representatives of labor get together with the board to organize an adjustment organization, as provided in the transportation act.
