

MONTANA'S OLDEST WHITE RESIDENT SAYS WHISKEY WAS BURIED

BROADUS, Mont., Feb. 18.—Twenty-two barrels of whiskey cached in 1874 by General Carter and General Reno, when they were pursued by Indians, is believed by M. C. Gilmore, 85, said to be Montana's oldest white resident, to be buried somewhere near the fork of the Big Powder River and Cache Creek, twenty miles from here.

Mr. Gilmore, who was a member of the party burying the whiskey, has been unable to locate the cache because, he thinks, the courses of the river and

the creek have changed many times since 1874.

When the whiskey was cached, Mr. Gilmore declared recently the soldiers buried it about four feet under the surface and then tramped down the soil.

State Issues 15 Mile License

What may be described as the first "15" mile license to be granted to a non-resident of Connecticut under an agreement between Connecticut and Massachusetts departments of motor vehicles has been issued. According to this agreement any motorist living in either State may obtain a license from the motor vehicle department of the other State which will entitle him to drive across the State line for a distance of 15 miles every day during the time he holds the license. The provision makes it necessary, however, for him to return to his own State with his machine at least once in thirty days. This agreement, it appears, was made for the convenience of motorists who have business in a town near the State line, but who live in another State.

UMATILLA WILL AID IN STATE LINE ROAD WORK

WALLA WALLA, Feb. 19.—The county commissioners of Umatilla county will assist in grading and graveling the state line road west from State Line station. This was stated by H. E. Bean, of Umatilla county, county commissioner for Umatilla county, who was in the city conferring with County Commissioner Cantorwine over that and other matters of county work.

It was agreed that the county commissioners of Umatilla county should come up either Saturday or Tuesday next with their engineer and meet Mr. Cantorwine and other representatives of Walla Walla county and go

over the road with them. The residents of the district had offered to donate the work, except the truck, the driver and the use of the truck, in graveling the road, the work to be done in January, but owing to the fact that all of the county trucks were out of commission it was impossible to do this and unless it is possible to do so before the farmers begin work they will not be able to donate the labor. In that event it will be paid for by Umatilla county in all probabilities.

Mr. Bean was also up to discuss the water question with the Walla Walla county commissioners, or at least to find out what they will pay. Columbia county, has adopted the same wage scale as Walla Walla county and Mr. Bean expressed the opinion that Umatilla will undoubtedly adopt the same scale.
