## NEWS NOTES OF PENDLETON

**Federal Officials Meet Here**  
Elmer Williams, assistant predatory animal inspector, arrived in Pendleton this morning and tomorrow will be joined by Stanley G. Jewett, the inspector for the Oregon-Washington district. Williams says the predatory animal trappers in Oregon have been getting better results this winter than have those in Washington. Jewett will arrive from Portland on the morning train.

**Retire \$10,000 Debt**  
It developed at the city council meeting last evening that the city has approximately \$10,000 on hand at this time and it was deemed advisable by the mayor that a \$10,000 loan being carried for the city jointly by the First National Bank and the American National Bank be taken up. Action to this effect was taken. The city has just been repaid the sum of \$5,000 borrowed some time ago by the water commission in connection with urgent work then needed on the water system.

**Date Is Changed.**  
The Grand Army state encampment, scheduled to be held here June 8, 9 and 10, will be held June 14, 15 and 16, as the first dates conflict with the Portland Rose Festival. Word to this effect was received today by S. P. Hutchinson, commander of Kit Carson Post, from C. A. Williams, assistant adjutant general for the G. A. R. Eight hundred of 1000 G. A. R. men are expected to be here for the convention. There are 12 G. A. R. men registered in the local post and Mr. Hutchinson asks that they meet with him Saturday at 2:30 p. m. in the city hall to make plans for the meeting here. The encampment was held here once before in former years when Assessor Brannin was commander of the post.
