Traffic Causes Boost Business.
 Violators of the law appearing in the city police court have shown an increase with each succeeding year, according to figures secured from the city recorder's office. February of 1921 had the largest number on the docket of the last six years when 46 violators appeared to answer charges. However, the ever presence of moonshine and contraband liquors had little to do with the increase because most of the violations were of the traffic laws of the state. The activities of State Officer Saltzman during the latter days of the month had a great deal to do with the increase. The preceding month of January had 26 law violators before the court. During the month of February, 1920, there were 25 cases before the court, while in the year 1919 there were 14. The year 1918 has 16 cases for the month, while 1917 has 22 and 1916 has 18 cases.
