**Nominal Supply At North Portland**  
(From the Oregon Journal.)  
There was only one small load in the North Portland alleys Wednesday and trade conditions were of nominal character.  
The only arrival consisted of a small load of 42 hogs. These sold around \$11.25 for tops and that is the extreme quotation given here for the day, although the market is considered nominally strong.  
Further gains were made in the eastern swine markets for Wednesday and Chicago was within a mere fraction of the Portland price.

**Political Strain Causes Fresh Upturn**  
CHICAGO, Mar. 3.—(A. P.)—Fresh upturns in wheat prices took place yesterday owing chiefly to European political strain. The market closed unsettled, 1 to 1 1/2 net higher, with

March 1.87 1/2 to 1.88 and May 1.59 1/4 to 1.59 1/2. Corn finished 1/4 to 1 up and oats at an advance of 1-3/4 to 2-3/4 1/2.  
In provisions the outcome was unchanged to 1/8 lower.  
A general rush to the buying side brought a sharp advance in wheat in the early trading, but many holders realized on the bulge and top prices failed to hold. Further export demand was a factor in strengthening the market and so notable lightness of rural offerings. Besides it was contended that European conditions would force higher prices regardless of whether or not there was crop damage in the United States. Official famine reports from India tended somewhat to emphasize this view.  
Corn and oats paralleled the action of wheat. Export business in corn kept up and domestic demand was fairly good. Selling by packers weakened provisions.

LONDON, Mar. 3.—(A. P.)—At the wool auction sales today 12,694 bales were offered. There was a hesitating demand and prices were irregular. Merinos were from 19 to 29 percent +4 crossbreds from 20 to 25 per cent down. Prussia, Ardena and Falkland offerings showed a decline ranging from five to 10 per cent.

### TAXES COLLECTED LOST TO TREASURY

LONDON, March 2.—(A. P.)—The allies have reached a complete agreement upon her answer to Germany on the reparations and upon the consequences that will follow Germany's failure to accept their terms. Lloyd George has consented to the employment of an armed force in the event of Germany's non-compliance to the extent of occupation of Mannehelm by the British, French and Belgian troops, and also of Ruhr ports on the Rhine where coal is handled.

### BURLESON REQUESTS HIS RESIGNATION BE HANDED TO HARDING

WASHINGTON, (U. P.) Mar. 3.—Postmaster General, Burleson is going to resign, a step many critics have demanded during the past six years. "I am going to leave my resignation here and I want you to see that it is presented to President Harding early on the morning of March 5," he told white house attachés. It is not necessary for cabinet members to resign at the end of an administration, although some have done so.
