JOE BECKETT WILL TEST QUALITY OF U. S. RING CANVAS

Most Often Knocked Out Pug of the Ring Coming Here From England He Declares.

NEW YORK, March 7.—(A. P.)—Joe Beckett, the most knocked out pug of the ring, is coming over to test the quality of American canvas.

The heavyweight champion of England has written to Charles Harvey to get him some work over here, as he is planning to bundle himself aboard a boat in a short time.

Beckett's star act is curling upon the canvas, so Harvey anticipates no trouble getting some of the second or third rats heavier around here to push over the Englishman.

Joe has been having some trouble in London with Tommy Burns, former heavyweight champion of the world.

Burns has been writing fight for a London paper and has taken several good verbal punches at the champion. Beckett resented the criticism and told Burns about it one evening in a public place. Words followed and, according to the story, Burns flattened Beckett without ceremony.

Now some of the promoters want to match the pair. Burns says he is willing to take on the champion for a side bet of two thousand pounds and will give the receipts to charity. Beckett is quiet.

Tex Hickard figures that Beckett would be a good card once as a lot of New Yorkers would be willing to pay to see how he does it.

EXHIBITION GAMES GIVE FANS CHANCE TO COMPARE TEAMS

Inter-League Contests Between Major Clubs Start in South Within Very Short Time.

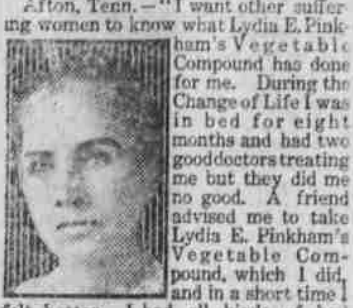
NEW YORK, March 7.—(A. P.)—Inter-League spring exhibition games between the clubs of the major circuits will be in full swing within the next few days, giving baseball fans their first opportunity to compare the relative strength of the rival pennant combinations. The development of this feature of the southland training expeditions has made marked advance during recent seasons. The schedules show that a big percentage of the 16 clubs, composing the National and American Leagues, will play such contests previous to the opening of the 1921 pennant races.

A study of the anti-season dates of the major league teams indicates a lot of more than 70 such games scheduled and with favorable conditions during March and the early part of April, fully two-thirds of these contests will probably be played. A large majority are cared for the south and southwest, although several of the clubs will complete their spring training with a series of home games just before the opening of the regular season.

The exhibition schedule opened with contest between the Philadelphia Americans and the St. Louis Nationals at Houston, Tex., today and for the next five weeks, one or more such events are scheduled for decision each day. Two city series are involved for the St. Louis and the Philadelphia clubs will each figure in games on their home grounds just before the opening of the pennant chase.
