**French Soldiers on Move Early**  
LONDON, March 8.—(U. P.)—Although Marshal Foch did not receive orders from the allied leaders to advance until late yesterday afternoon and did not transmit his instructions to the troops until 4:25 p. m. A telephone message from Dusseldorf via Amsterdam said that French soldiers were on the move early in the afternoon. Three shipments slipped up the Rhine and passed Coblenz before 6 o'clock. Ten others were en route north. Billington orders were placed along the route and all preparations completed for the care of the soldiers. The position of the American army at Coblenz is obscure, but it is certain they were to take no part in the advance. The question of American held in the establishment of a strong customs line along the Rhine caused the allies worry. They professed to believe the Americans will aid. The plans called for the occupation of Dusseldorf by the French, Duisburg by the Belgians, and Ruhrort by the British.

**German City Occupied**  
PARIS, March 8.—(U. P.)—The French war office announced officially that the German city of Dusseldorf was occupied at 6 a. m. The occupation of Ruhrort was also accomplished without incident. The allied river fleet is anchored off the port. General Simon is in command of the forces at Dusseldorf and General Montbert of the troops at Ruhrort it is stated. The army of occupation consists of infantry, cavalry, tanks, and motor machine guns.
