Sheep Higher At North Portland
(From the Oregon Journal.)
When 11 carloads of livestock came to North Portland Wednesday, only limited supplies were available for the trade. Most of the stock was direct to killers. Hogs were steady, cattle steady and sheep generally higher. Eastern markets were higher in practically all alleys for the day.
Just a nominal number of sheep and lambs were available for the North Portland market Monday, although there was a liberal run of the total supply received—1219 head—2989 head were on contract to killers and therefore were not offering.
For the limited stocks available the market showed real strength and active buying resulted. East of the mountain staff showed no change in price, but the differential between

that class and Willamette valley offerings was lessened, the latter advancing to \$8.50 during the day. Advances were general for practically all other lines with the exception of ewes.

Wheat Prices Come Back With Vigor
(CHICAGO, March 10.—(A. P.)—Wheat prices rebounded with vigor today from a fall due to the government report on farm reserves. The market closed unsettled, half to 2 net higher, with March 1.67 3/4 to 1.63 and May 1.59 1/2 to 1.60. Corn finished 5-8 to 3-4 1/2-5 up, oats unchanged to a shade advance and provisions at gains of five to 10.
After midday the upward sailing of values attained force in good earnest, driving the market 5 to 5 1/2 above the bottom figures of the session, with only moderate setbacks at the last.
Corn and oats swayed with wheat but kept inside of narrower limits. Provisions were governed chiefly by the action of grain.

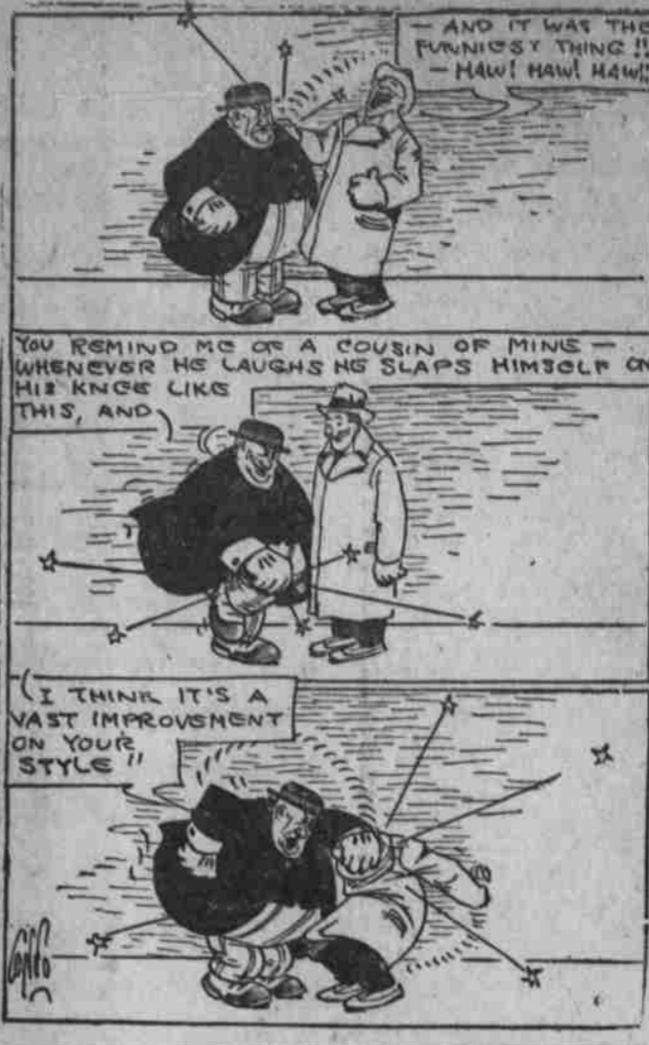
Evaporated Apples Are Scarce

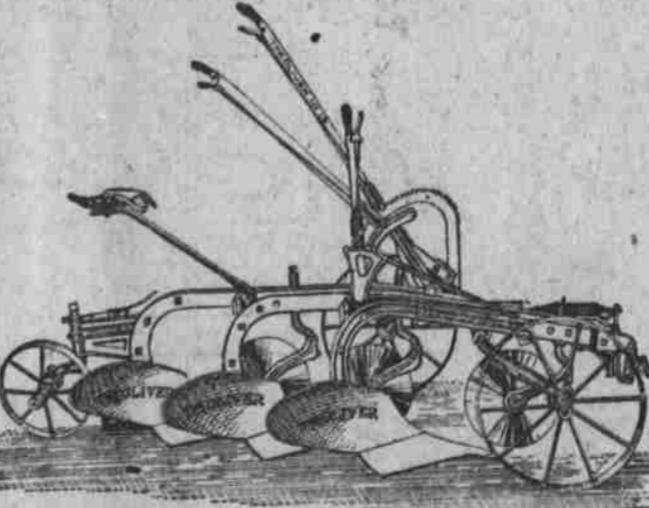
