#### Chicago Highest For Hog Supplies

(From the Oregon Journal.)  
North Portland fell from grace today, when it lost the high point on hogs to Chicago. This is for regularly recognized stockyards, although some of the minor yards without regular receipts may at times quite more. There were only limited arrivals in all lines here for the Thursday trade and prices were unchanged.

Chicago showed a further advance for hogs Thursday. In fact, this was true of practically all the leading markets, with the exception of North Portland. Tops in the Windy City advanced to \$11.55, and while it is true that \$11.50 was received for a handful of prime at North Portland Wednesday, no carloads have been sold at this extreme mark and therefore nothing higher than \$11.50 is recognized as a quotation.

On the basis of what hogs are today costing in the East, it is an inference to local producers to keep the price down to the present level.
