All of the City of Pendleton held at the Council Chambers in Pendleton, Oregon on March 16th, 1921, the following Resolution was duly adopted:

WHEREAS, the City Surveyor of the City of Pendleton did on the 9th day of March, 1921, under direction and by requirement of the Common Council file in the office of the Recorder of the City of Pendleton, plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of the following named street in said city:

Thompson Street from the north right of way line of the O. W. R. & N. Co. to the south line of High Street, together with the estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement and the percentage of the total cost of improvement, which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should

pay on account of the benefits to be derived from such improvement, and WHEREAS, the Council has examined such plans and specifications and estimates and found the same satisfactory and the estimates therefor to be in accordance with the probable cost of such work, and

WHEREAS, the property recommended by the City Surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is in the judgment of the Common Council properly to be included within such improvement District and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein, and

WHEREAS, the improvement of the hereinabove described portions of Thompson Street either gravel Bitulithic pavement, concrete pavement or Warrenite Bitulithic pavement on crushed rock or crushed gravel foundation is at this time necessary, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the Common Council of the City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve Thompson Street from the north right of way line of the O. W. R. & N. Company to the south line of High Street, by paving the same with either gravel Bitulithic pavement or concrete pavement or Warrenite Bitulithic pavement on crushed rock or crushed gravel foundation; such pavement to be constructed and the surface thereof to be finished upon the established grade of said street and the street to have curbs and gutters and all other things in accordance with and as shown in the plans and specifications for the improvement of said portions of said Thompson Street from the north right of way line of the O. W. R. & N. Company to the south line of High Street, prepared by F. B. Hayes, City Surveyor, filed with the Recorder of said City on the 9th day of March, 1921,

which said plans and specifications are hereby particularly referred to, and be it further

RESOLVED that the Engineer's estimates of the probable total cost of such improvement, which said City Engineer's estimates were made and prepared by F. B. Hayes, City Surveyor of said City, in the sum of \$13,245.55 and was filed with the Recorder of said City on the 9th day of March 1921, is hereby included and hereby referred to particularly; and be it further

RESOLVED that the plans and specifications and estimates for such improvement as prepared by the City Surveyor and filed with the Recorder of the City of Pendleton on the 9th day of March, 1921, be and they are hereby adopted and approved, and be it further

Resolved that the cost of making such improvement shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land so specially benefited by such improvement shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof, and be it further

RESOLVED that an Assessment District is hereby created to be known as "Assessment District No. 73" embracing the property benefited and to be assessed for the payment of such improvements, which Assessment District shall include all lots, parts of lots, and parcels of land lying and being within the district bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

Commencing from the northeast corner of lot 12, block 113, Reservation addition to Pendleton, Oregon, thence 1265 ft. 2 3/4 in. in a southerly direction and parallel with the east line of Thompson Street, thence 260 ft. in a

westerly direction and parallel with the south line of High Street, thence 1265 ft. 2 3/4 in. in a northerly direction and parallel with the west line of Thompson Street, thence 260 ft. in an easterly direction and along the south line of the O. W. R. & N. Co. right of way line to the point of beginning.

And be it further

RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution together with a notice that the surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land is on file in the office of the City Recorder, be published for a period of ten days in the East Oregonian, which newspaper is hereby designated by the Common Council for the publication thereof.

And notice is further given that the Surveyor's estimate of the cost of said improvement to be assessed against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land on account of said improvement is now on file in the office of the City Recorder, subject to inspection. Done and dated at Pendleton Oregon this 17th day of March 1921.

NEW YORK, March 15.—(U. P.)—Receivers have been appointed for Gaston, Williams and Wiggins Inc., one of the largest exporting and importing concerns in the United States. The liabilities are said to be \$6,000,000.

CITY OF MOSCOW IS IN CRITICAL CONDITION DUE TO FOOD SHORTAGE

BERLIN, March 15.—(Carl D. Groat, U. P. Staff Correspondent)—Authoritative dispatches from Moscow described the city in a critical condition due to food scarcity. Bolshevik authorities are exerting themselves to avert the threat of a general strike, by extension of food and clothing rations.

WHOLESALE PRICES DROP 38 1-2 PER CENT

WASHINGTON, March 15.—(U. P.)—Wholesale prices have dropped 38 1/2 percent since the peak of the war level, in May 1920, the labor department has announced. During February the wholesale price dropped 1 1/2 percent. Food and building materials each declined 7 per cent in February, as compared with January. The declines are also in other groups of commodities, including tobacco, lubricating oil, newspaper paper and rubber.

NUGGET IS FOUND IN JOSEPHINE CO.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., March 15.—To stumble onto a 12-ounce nugget of almost pure gold was the experience of a Josephine county prospector last week. The find was made in the Illinois valley on the divide between Sucker and Althouse creeks, but on the Althouse slope. The nugget assayed more than \$200. The Boswell and other rich mines are located in the vicinity where the nugget was found.

GRAIN GROWERS TO CONFER AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, March 15.—(U. P.)—Representatives of the principal grain growing states will meet here April 6 to consider the American Farm Bureau Federation's co-operative grain marketing plan.

State meetings will select delegates to the Chicago gathering. Farm Bureau members will be invited to attend. The "improved" grain marketing plan creates a "national sales agency" controlled by the membership. The agency will control terminals, warehouses, export, finances and service departments and is organized on a non-stock, non-profit basis. Its purpose is to shorten the road from consumer to producer and eliminate charges the farmer believes excessive.
