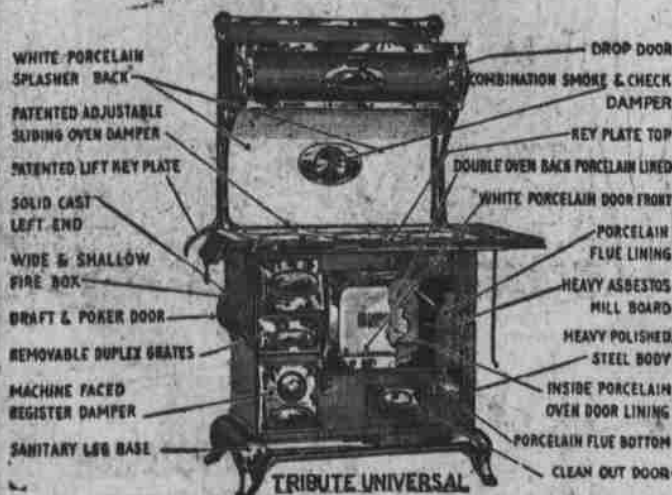

## HARD TIMES IN JAPAN

TOKIO, March 18.—(U. P.)—Judicial officers of Japan are appalled at the great number of bankruptcy cases which took place as a result of the great financial slump which struck the Empire in March and which lasted throughout the year. While figures have been compiled for the first ten months of 1920 only, it is shown that during that period no less than 1,428 bankruptcies took place, while, as the number increased during the end of the year, the total is likely to reach about 2,000.
