DUKE RECEIVES KING'S SUIT

MADRID, March 24.—(A. P.)—Great ceremony attends the gift of the suit of clothes worn by the King of Spain on his day to which suit the Duke of Alcala, Count of Huelva, possesses the hereditary right. This he inherited from an ancestor of the fifteenth century, who obtained the grant from the King of Castile, Juan II, who changed suits with the Duke's forebear on the battlefield of Alcala, where the king was in danger of being captured by his victorious enemies, but succeeded in escaping in his vassal's suit.

The state coach accompanied by royal footmen in ancient liveries and bearing staves, conveys the suit to the Madrid palace of the Duke, who receives it with due deference and adds it to the considerable museum he possesses, which forms an historical record of men's fashions dating back a long time.

The day following the delivery of the suit, the Duke goes to the Royal palace and renounces his vows of eternal allegiance to the King.
