CHICAGO, March 30.—(A. P.)—Confidence that little if any damage had been done by the cold wave led to downturns in the wheat prices yesterday after an early advance. The close was unsettled at 1-2c decline to 1c gain, with May 1.45 to 1.43 1/4 and July 1.24@1.26 1/4.

Wheat started with a decided upward slant, shorts rushing to cover because of crop damage reports. A leading expert, however, declared that the roots of the wheat plant as a rule had apparently escaped harm.
