## Architects Plan Wing

Maurice Whitehouse, architect for the new wing to be constructed at the State Hospital, and W. C. Knighton, consulting architect, are in Pendleton from Portland today making arrangements for advertising for bids for the contract. The wing is to cost \$160,000 and work will probably begin in about 60 days. The wing will contain three wards and full basement and is to house 180 patients. In general architecture it will follow the plan of the state hospital as the structure now stands.

## 400,000 Bushels Sold

There has been a heavy movement of wheat here lately with the result that a vast amount of grain has passed from the hands of local growers, the ruling price being in the vicinity of \$1.10 per bushel. It is estimated by H. W. Collins that 400,000 bushels has been sold within the last two weeks. Mr. Collins now estimates that but 18 or 20 per cent of last year's wheat is now in the hands of the farmers. It is understood that the low opening price of July wheat in Chicago has caused some farmers to turn their wheat.

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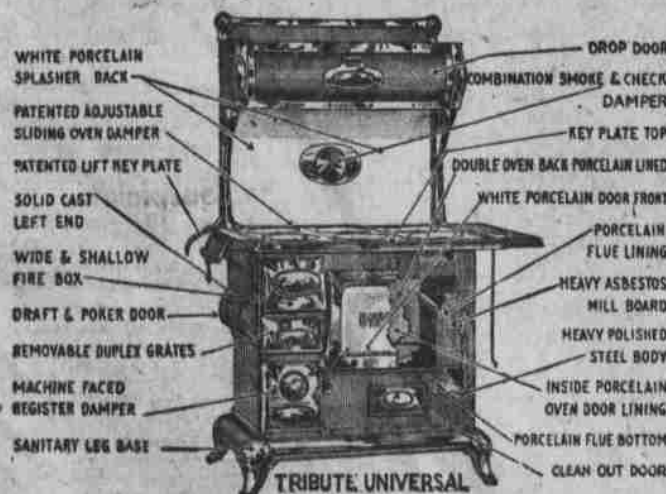
