POMONA FAVORS BLUE LAWS ACCORDING TO ELECTION HELD TODAY

Ordinance Will be Changed Theatres Will Remain Open in Order to Make Test Case.

POMONA, Calif., April 5.—(U. P.)—Pomona went on record in favor of the blue laws closing all the city's amusement places on Sunday. The "blue jays" triumphed by a margin of 55 votes. The blue law ordinance received 2078 favorable votes. Chairman Harry Arthur of the American league freedom, declared his organization will take legal steps to determine the validity of the vote. The theatres, Arthur asserted, will continue to operate after the ordinance is effective May 11th in order to make a test case. George T. Liddle, chairman of the civic betterment league, proponents of the ordinance, declared the victory was a protest against the "out of town forces which brazenly endeavored to force their low standard of morality upon the people."

CARDINALS WILL BE FILED

BALTIMORE, Md., April 5.—(A. P.)—The will of Cardinal Gibbons, filed day on route to Seattle where he will about \$100,000. To Bishop O. B. Carrigan, administrator of the Baltimore diocese, the Rev. L. R. Stickney, rector of the cathedral, and the Rev. E. J. Connelly, chancellor of the diocese, is left the bulk of the late prelate's estate.

AUTOMOBILE MAN AND 6 MACHINES DISAPPEAR

PORTLAND, April 5.—(U. P.)—As the result of the disappearance of William Jacklin, a prominent automobile dealer, and the removal of six expensive machines from his establishment, an investigation into the concerns affairs was started by District Attorney Evans. Jacklin dropped from sight Saturday afternoon. The machines mysteriously disappeared Saturday night.

ALIMONY ORDERED PAID

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., April 5.—(A. P.)—The court ordered the alimony and the counsel fees in the divorce proceedings brought by James A. Stillman paid within 30 days and Stillman's counsel announced an appeal from the court order expunging from the records the letters said to have been written by Mrs. Stillman and the Indian guide.

'LONG, LONG TRAIL' OF WORTHLESS CHECKS IS BEING FOLLOWED

CHICAGO, April 5.—(U. P.)—Secret service men are following the "long, long trail" of worthless checks and I. O. U.'s that winds to the cell of Everett Harding, who posed as the president's cousin. "Cousin Everett" was arrested for obtaining money while impersonating a government official and is still held because he lacked the \$5,000 bond. "Cousin Everett" authorities say, duped many politicians and others, by promising them government jobs, he said he could secure because of his influence and relationship to "Cousin Warren."
