GERMAN AUTHORITIES HAVE MADE PROTEST TO RHINELAND COMMISSION

WASHINGTON, April 7.—(U. P.)—General "Hell and Mariah" Dawes broke all investigation speed records. He jammed through in less than two days, as Chairman of Harding's special commission to prove the treatment of disabled soldiers; recommendations that mean adequate hospital treatment to 10,000 wounded veterans now in poor houses, asylums or insufficiently equipped hospitals, or in no institutions at all. "My God, what is the use of wasting time?" said Dawes. "We had something to do. The wounded soldiers are waiting. Why not shoot and get through?" The committee has filed the report and recommendations.
