#### Wheat and Rye in Excellent Condition

SPokane, April 8.—(A. P.)—The winter wheat and rye crops of Washington have come through the winter in excellent condition, according to the April report of G. E. Ray of the local office of the federal bureau of crop estimates issued here yesterday. The report also states that breeding sows show market decrease in number this year and that the farm labor supply in the state is above normal.

Concerning the Washington state winter wheat crop the report states the average condition on April 1 was 100 per cent of normal; the best condition that has obtained on April 1 for a number of years. One year ago the condition was 73 per cent normal. Assuming the average abandonment of acreage and average influences prevailing until harvest, the April 1 condition forecasts a production of about 21,784,000 bushels, as compared with 20,120,000 in 1920 and 20,425,000 in 1919.

The rye crop of the state the report says averaged 93 per cent normal as against 82 per cent a year ago and 51 per cent the ten year average as against 52 per cent a year ago and 84 per cent the ten year average condition on April 1.

#### Feeding Sows Decreased in Per Cent

As compared with last year, according to the report, the estimated number on April 1 being 30,000 against 33,000 in 1920 and 35,000 in 1919.

Labor conditions were estimated to be 20 per cent better than a year ago and 3 per cent above the normal supply on April 1. The report stated the demand for farm labor was 11 per cent lower this year than last and 9 per cent below the normal need.

#### Bears Have Tuning

NEW YORK, April 8.—(A. P.)—The stock market yesterday relinquished part of the general advance registered earlier in the week, developments favoring the short interest.

London cables stressed the more ominous aspects of the British industrial situation and occasioned moderate liquidation.

Domestic industrial conditions also became more complicated by the decision of the railroad labor board denying application of the New York central for immediate provisional reduction of the unskilled labor wage schedule.

Publication of the government crop report, forecasting the fourth largest winter wheat yield in history failed to

#### stimulate transportation shares, some of which, including grangers, were decidedly heavy.

Market prices were at lowest averages in the last half hour, when free selling resulted from an unexpected advance in call money from 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 per cent; due, according to reports, to calling of loans by interior banks.

Stocks most affected comprised a number of industrials and specialties, eaters and chemicals, together with numerous allied issues.

Sales 150,000 shares.

Exchange rates on London and Paris eased only slightly. Liberty bonds were firm, but most other domestic and foreign issues lacked definite trend. Total sales, par value, \$11,875,000.

#### Wheat Estimate Lower than Expected

CHICAGO, April 8.—(A. P.)—Wheat averaged higher yesterday, owing to buying based on correct anticipations that the government crop report would suggest a smaller yield than recent private estimates. The market closed unsettled, at the same as yesterday's finish to 1 1/4 advance, with May 1.36 to 1.36 1/4 and July 1.13 to 1.13 1/4. Corn gained 1/4 to 5-8 and oats 3-8 to 1/2 5-8. In provisions the outcome was 25 to 75 decline.

According to the government report a yield of \$21,000,000 bushels may be looked for, whereas until yesterday a majority of traders were expecting \$20,000,000 to \$20,000,000 bushels.

#### London Wool Market Shows Little Life

LONDON, April 8.—(A. P.)—At the wool auction sales yesterday 3,812 bales of free wool were offered. There was a moderate demand, but half of the offerings were sold at unchanged prices. Six thousand bales of government wool were withdrawn, owing to the high limits. The government sales for tomorrow and next week have been cancelled. Free wools will be offered from Monday to Friday, inclusive.

#### M. P. Closes Shop

ST. LOUIS, April 8.—(A. P.)—The Missouri Pacific railway shops at Sedalia, Mo., and Argenta, Ark., the largest on the system, were closed temporarily yesterday as a retrenchment measure. It was announced at headquarters here.

All are expected to resume operations about May 1.

#### Encouraging Foreign Trade

BALTIMORE, April 8.—(A. P.)—Speaking here last night J. H. De Fries, president of the chamber of commerce of the U. S., said the business structure of this country can never be put in satisfactory condition unless we give adequate attention to foreign trade.

Mr. De Fries lauded the attitude of the present national administration, from which much good may be expected, he said.

#### Extend Belgium Credit

BRUSSELS, April 8.—(A. P.)—Negotiations between Argentina and Belgium concerning importation of large quantities of South American wool have terminated with the former government authorizing the Argentine National Bank to allow two years credit on such shipments.
