### Try-Outs to Be Held.

Try-outs are to be held April 23 at the Round-Up grounds to determine the contestants from the grade schools of Pendleton in the county field and track meet to be held at the grounds on Saturday, May 7. Miss Eva Hansen, physical training teacher, is in charge and says that the youngsters, both boys and girls, are showing a marked interest in the athletic events. The children will be divided into four groups, according to weight, as follows: Group A, 70 pounds and under; group B, 100 pounds and under; group C, 115 pounds and under and group D, all above 115 pounds.

### Boy Scouts Take Hike.

Members of Troop No. 1 of the Pendleton Boy Scouts took a hike to the mission today under the leadership of Scout Leader Cornelison. There are thirty-two members of the troop, and a majority joined in the

hike. They "fell in" in front of the city hall this morning.

### Bennion to Return.

Fred Bennion, county agent, is expected to return tomorrow from Chicago where he attended the big national grain growers meeting.

### Pictures Are Collected.

Charles Wellington Furlong is collecting Round-Up pictures to be used in the book "Let 'er Buck" which is soon to be published and which has the big Pendleton show as its theme. Colonel Furlong has found some interesting pictures which will be used as illustrations.

### Patrols to Be Added.

The fire patrol season in the Umatilla national forest will probably begin about July 1, says J. C. Kuhns, forest supervisor. At that date, the nine year-long employees on the forest will be augmented by 19 additional men. If a heavy fall of rain comes in June and July, Mr. Kuhns states, the moisture will do much toward saving the forests from serious fires.

### Test Fire Apparatus.

Another preliminary test of the new fire engine was given this morning under the direction of Chief Ringold, when a stream of water was thrown to the top of the Collins Flour Mill. The preliminary tests are being held in preparation for the examination that will be held some time during the coming week by an official underwriters' examiner. The machine is doing excellent work in the tests that have been held to date.

### Trout Fisher Gets Fine.

A mere handful of trout, caught before the opening of the season, proved rather expensive for Seth Riedon, 15-year-old Pendleton boy, who yesterday was found guilty of the charge in the court of Justice Joe H. Parkes. A fine of \$25 was given the lad. Young Riedon had purchased a license but the change of the opening dates of the season from April 1 to April 15 caught him napping. He was arrested by W. H. Albee, deputy game warden.

### Invited to Attend Convention.

An invitation from the Portland Chamber of Commerce to the Pendleton Commercial Association to join the Portland body in attending the Eighth National Foreign Trade convention which will be held at Cleveland May 4 to May 7 has been received by Secretary Claude Barr. A special car will be provided for the delegates who go and the Union Pacific has promised to make a special rate for the round trip.

### Demonstration on Friday.

A paper dress form demonstration will be held at the library in Hermiton at 1:30 next Friday afternoon, says Mrs. Edith G. Van Deusen, home demonstration agent. Two dress forms will be made. Last Tuesday and Wednesday, Mrs. Van Deusen conducted a pressure cooker demonstration at the Stanfield and also conducted a school for the making of gingham dresses. On Thursday and Friday hats and gingham dresses were made in Columbia district under her direction.

### Club Re-Organized.

The Round-Up Tennis Club was re-organized at an enthusiastic meeting last night in the Commercial club rooms, when Alger Pies was chosen president, and Guy Johnson secretary. Treasurer, D. D. Hobart, Ernest Crockett and Carl Halterman were appointed as a ground committee. Both men and women are eligible to membership and the membership fee has been reduced from \$10 to \$5. As soon as the courts can be put in shape, games will be played at the Round-Up grounds.

### Mesher Faces Charge.

N. Mesher, who at one time was a Pendleton resident, now of Goldendale, is facing a white slave charge and will be taken to Bickleton, Washington for a hearing before a United States commissioner. Mesher was arrested following the arrest of Alice Baldwin upon a charge of improper conduct. The girl came to Goldendale with Mesher early in March and passed as his wife, but on her arrest admitted they were not married. She said she first became associated with Mesher in Pendleton, a year ago. The woman gave her age as 18 years and said that her parents lived at Detroit, Mich.


