Description of Campbell's Bean Soup

Choice hand picked Michigan Pea Beans, after being soaked, washed, repicked by hand and rinsed, are boiled in water until they are thoroughly cooked.

Potatoes, carrots, celery and a suggestion of tomato is then added. A blend of pork, bacon and onions, having been first thoroughly cooked, is then stirred into the soup. White pepper, salt, spice and other flavors are finally cooked in. In all, fifteen ingredients are used.

The Soup is completed by being repeatedly passed through fine screens until it assumes a remarkably smooth texture. It is then filled into the cans and sterilized. Their successive operations yield a thick rich soup of uniform consistency and an attractive appearance and taste.

CHINESE HAVE "TAG" DAY.

PEKING, April 11.—(U. P.)—Chinese girls by the hundreds in this city, Tientsin and Shanghai—daughters of the wealthiest merchants, carefully hidden in big, walled-in homes, or girls not so lucky in riches or comfort—are forming societies to give food to other starving girls in the famine area. They are contributing funds by self-denial of some favorite food.

The up-to-date boarding schools are the leaders in this girls' enterprise. Hundreds of the Baldwin school at Nanchang, have pledged themselves to give without meat and give the equivalent in money to the famine fund. This particular form of self denial is spreading all over China. The results already show that thousands of children will be saved through the sacrifice of these young women.

This is the principal means by which Chinese girls are helping the nation in its crisis, but it is by no means the only one. In the series of "tag days" in this city, Shanghai, Tientsin and other towns, young Chinese girls of the best families went openly on the streets—an unheard of thing—and "tagged" pedestrians and auto and rickshaw parties. Large sums were raised by this method.
