#### LAZIEST MAN ROLE HARD WORK FOR CAREY

"It is much more of an art to portray on the screen the character of a popular novel," remarked Harry Carey recently, "than to film an original story or one made from a stage play. In characterizing an original story, the actor need only use his own imagination and play the part as he believes it should be portrayed. In putting on the screen a play that has been produced on the stage, the film actor can copy his character after the player who had portrayed it in the original drama. In sketching a character from a popular novel, however, the actor must take into consideration

the fact that many thousands have read the story and each reader has visualized his own conception of the part. It is therefore an interesting task for the player to put himself in the place of the many readers and try to create a composite character—a combination of the various conceptions that might have been formed by the different people who have perused the tale."

The character of the lazy, shiftless and generally useless Jim Golden in "If Only Jim's Baby," was so interesting to Harry Carey, that he now is portraying the role in Universal's adaptation of the story, presented on the screen under the title of "If Only Jim," and coming to the Arcade Theatre today. It is a different character from any yet portrayed by Carey, and the actor is said to play the role in a way that wins the sympathy of the audience in spite of the fellow's many shortcomings.

#### JAPANESE PRESIDENT OF STEAMSHIP COMPANY IS COLLEGE GRADUATE

TOKIO, April 12.—(A. P.)—Japan's greatest steamship company, the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, has selected as its president Yonehiro Ito, who is a graduate of the University of Michigan. Mr. Ito who has been serving as vice president of the company, takes the place of Baron Rempel Kondo, who died recently.

In a statement to the press, President Ito said that the world's supply of ships is so in excess of the cargo demand that it is natural that the freight market should be as depressed as it is. He considered the outlook a dark one and said that Japan should be prepared to face a long period of serious depression in the shipping business.

SHIP 14,000 BARRELS OF FLOUR ASTORIA, April 12.—(U. P.)—One of the first shipments of reviving trade with the territories of Central Europe as it is carried out with the Pacific Coast is seen in the shipment of 14,000 barrels of flour from the Port of Astoria terminals to the Czech-Slovak government.

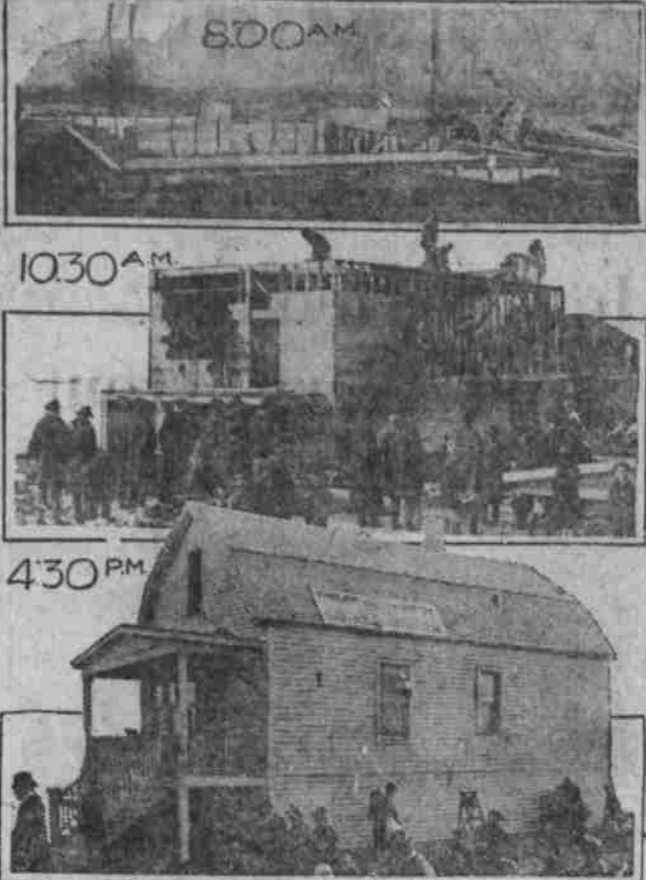
The movement of so large a quantity of flour at a time when the market is very poor, and to one of the new-born countries of Europe, has awakened marked interest among milling and shipping men. The flour was milled in the new 4000-barrel per day plant on Pier 1 of the Port of Astoria terminals, and was shipped on the Holland-American line steamer Moevally for Hamburg, whence it will be sent overland to the Czech territory.
