JURY IS CALLED THIS A. M. FOR KERLEY CASE

A special venire of three men had to be called this morning after the regular venire had been exhausted in the effort that is being made to secure a jury to try the case in which Joe Kerley is facing charges of embezzlement. At noon recess of court today the state had exhausted all but one of the peremptory challenges allowed it and the defense still had a margin of two challenges on which to proceed. It was expected that the jury for the trial of the case would be secured shortly after the beginning of the afternoon session.

The criminal action against Kerley followed as the aftermath to the discovery of certain alleged irregularities in his business which was made last autumn. He was in the loan and insurance business and also acted as a buying agent in the grain business.

The extent of his alleged shortage on which the present action is being tried is said to amount to approximately \$5,500. A great deal of interest has been shown in his case. A larger crowd than usual was present in the court room today to hear the proceedings.

It is thought probable that it will require all day Thursday and possibly Friday to secure all of the testimony in the case. Many witnesses will be examined. The state's case is in the hands of District Attorney R. L. Keator and Deputy C. Z. Randall. The defendant is represented by Peterson, Bishop and Clark.

TOWN FAVORS RECALL OF STATE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSIONER

MILWAUKIE, Ore., April 13.—(U. P.)—The town has declared war against the telephone company and the public service commission. At a mass meeting the citizens approved a resolution to ignore the recent increase in telephone rates and pay only the old amount. The meeting also went on record as favoring a recall of the state Public Service Commissioner Fred Williams.

BOOZE RUNNER HELD INNOCENT BY JURY

SEATTLE, April 13.—(U. P.)—John ("Mysterious") Barrett, a Canadian, was acquitted of booze running charges by the federal court jury. Barrett is the alleged owner of a cargo of whiskey brought to Seattle by the Canadian launch Canada II, seized by the American coast guard. Barrett faces another federal liquor charge here.

EUGENE LAD IS SENT TO STATE REFORMATORY

CHEHALIS, April 13.—(U. P.)—Robert Campbell of Eugene, Oregon, was sentenced to from 2 to 2 years in the state reformatory after he had plead guilty to an attempted robbery of the State Bank of Napavine on Monday.

DAVID F. MORRISON, VETERAN NEWSPAPER MAN IS LAID TO REST

PORTLAND, April 13.—Final honors were paid David F. Morrison, veteran newspaper man and special writer for the Portland Telegram, by fellow craftsmen Monday afternoon in the funeral services held under the auspices of Portland lodge of Elks at the Elks temple. Friends connected with the various newspapers acted as pallbearers. Those were: David W. Haas, Arthur Crookham, Ralph W. Watson, J. L. Wallin, Horace E. Thomas, Paul R. Kelly, Fred L. Bonit, and W. C. Tunka. Interment was in Riverview cemetery.

Morrison, who had been on the staff of the Telegram for several years, was in the Orient at the time of his death, making a tour for his paper. He died at Shanghai March 2 from pneumonia. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Virginia Morrison, one daughter, Virginia of Portland; his mother, Mrs. G. L. Russell, and three sisters of Andover, Mass.

STOCKHOLM, April 13.—(A. P.)—The building by the Swedish government of the contemplated high power wireless station in Sweden for wireless communication with America has been postponed owing to the general economic depression.

TAILORS AND MILLINERS TRY TO BE INDEPENDENT

VIENNA, April 13.—(A. P.)—The master tailors and milliners of Vienna are having difficulty trying to maintain the independence of Paris models and styles in "women's" attire which they established in war time. While the war was in progress they declared an act of emancipation from the rule of the Rue de Paix and conducted a vigorous campaign all over the then enemy and neutral states to make Vienna, instead of Paris, the arbiter of women's fashions.

Now the tailors and milliners charge their own members with treason in yielding to feminine demand and bringing model costumes from Paris.

The tailors and milliners complain also of the competition in their trades which comes from the wives or widows of former Austrian army officers of influential social standing who have taken to millinery or to the restringing of costumes for the newly rich as a means of livelihood. One of these new competitors is the wife of an Austrian general and many of them have their shops in their own palaces or apartments. The master tailors are trying to have the labor laws amended so that no one may do such business without having served an apprenticeship of two and one-half years.
