GOVERNMENT SHOULD RECEIVE SUM OF MONEY

WASHINGTON, April 14.—(U. P.)—Bootleggers made profits totaling nearly a billion dollars last year, estimated on the basis of the internal revenue bureau reports showing approximately 30,000,000 gallons of liquor withdrawn from bonded warehouses in a year. Between two and five hundred million dollars should be paid the government in excess profits and income tax.

MISMANAGEMENT IS CHARGED TO BOARD

SEATTLE, April 14.—(U. P.)—Charges of gross mismanagement on the part of the shipping board are contained in a petition for the receivership, from the Sloan shippers, Anacortes shipbuilding company and the Capital City Iron works, filed in the federal court. The shipping board seized the plants during the war.

Men Receive Sentence.

OLYMPIA, April 14.—(A. P.)—The supreme court today upheld the conviction of the seven alleged I. W. W. members who were convicted of second degree murder in connection with the Centralla armistice day killings. They refused to grant a new trial. The men will be transferred from the Montesano county jail to the state prison to begin their sentences of from 25 to 49 years.

GOLD HELD IN FEDERAL COURT.

SEATTLE, April 14.—(U. P.)—Several pounds of gold dust and nuggets are in the federal court litigation. The metal represented part of the contents of the ill-fated Princess Sophia's safe, raised by a diver last summer. The Sophia sank in Alaskan waters two years ago. The testimony is being taken in court to determine the amount of expenses to be charged against the safe's contents.

MANY MATTERS WERE DISCUSSED BY COUNCIL

In the future when citizens of Pendleton seeking to have sewer extensions made for the convenience of property owners, they will be obliged to make connection with the sewer as soon as the extension is made. A ruling to this effect was made last night when attention was called by Councilman Friedly to the fact that a recent extension on Ash street, sought by property owners, was not being utilized to the extent indicated when the petition was made.

The initiation of a plan of preparing for beautifying the city of Pendleton was suggested by Mayor Hartman in an informal statement made to the city council. This plan would call for very little work at present, the mayor explained, but he declared that Pendleton should begin giving the matter serious consideration now before the city covers any more ground.

"Right now Portland with its quarter of a million population is planning to spend several millions of dollars for widening its streets and for other civic work," Mr. Hartman said. "With the new projects that are already assured, and other big improvements that are well on the way toward realization, I believe that the next ten years will see a big growth in the scope of its business, influence and activity."

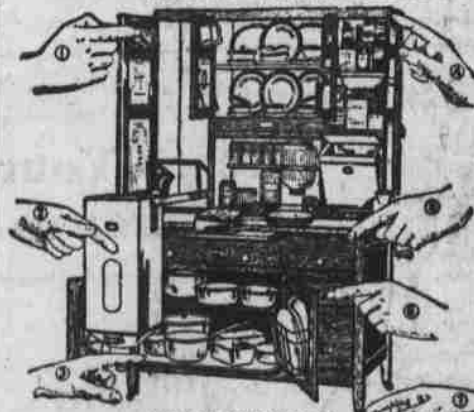
