FRANCE SUBMITS PLAN TO SUBDUDE GERMANS

PARIS, April 16.—(Webb Miller, U. P. Staff Correspondent.)—Complete plans for military and economic coercion of Germany by May 1, was submitted to the allies by Premier Briand. The plans, drawn up in a conference last night between Briand, President Millerand, Marshal Foch and Petain and minister of the liberated regions, Locheur, included the occupation of the Ruhr district and possibly the industrial part of Westphalia. Under Foch's recommendations, a decided recall of military clauses of 1918 and 1919, for three months. The marshal expressed the belief that 100,000 men were "sufficient to keep the Germans in check."
